MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING – July 26, 2021

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) was called to order at 5:00 p.m. by President Reinhart on July 26, 2021 in person at the District's headquarters located at 15600 Sand Canyon Avenue, Irvine, California and via teleconference pursuant to the provisions of the Governor's Executive Order N-08-21 due to COVID-19.

JUNE 2021 TREASURY REPORT

Following Director Swan's comment on Exhibit "B" noting IRWD's total fixed and variable rate debt amount of approximately \$641 million, on <u>MOTION</u> by Swan, seconded by LaMar and unanimously carried, THE BOARD RECEIVED AND FILED THE TREASURER'S INVESTMENT SUMMARY REPORT, THE SUMMARY OF FIXED AND VARIABLE RATE DEBT, AND DISCLOSURE REPORT OF REIMBURSEMENTS TO BOARD

MEMBERS AND STAFF, APPROVED THE JUNE 2021 SUMMARY OF PAYROLL ACH PAYMENTS IN THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF \$2,178,699, AND APPROVED THE JUNE 2021 ACCOUNTS PAYABLE DISBURSEMENT SUMMARY OF WARRANTS 418630 THROUGH 419653, WORKERS' COMPENSATION DISTRIBUTIONS, WIRE TRANSFERS, PAYROLL WITHHOLDING DISTRIBUTIONS AND VOIDED CHECKS IN THE TOTAL AMOUNT OF \$17,143,433.

IRWD STRATEGIC MEASURES

Following Director Swan's comment on the recycled water measurement noting it was considerably lower than planned, on <u>MOTION</u> by Swan, seconded by LaMar and unanimously carried, THE IRWD STRATEGIC MEASURES ITEM WAS RECEIVED AND FILED.

APPROVAL OF FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT FOR SYPHON RESERVOIR IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

General Manager Cook reported that staff will be presenting the key elements of the final Environmental Impact Report for the Syphon Reservoir Improvement project this evening, and during this process will be accepting comments in the Webex chat function as well as in person.

Using a PowerPoint presentation, Environmental Compliance Analyst Corey provided a map of the reservoir location, and then reviewed the key project objectives as follows: 1) to improve local water supply reliability by reducing the need to purchase costly Metropolitan Water District imported water; 2) to maximize the use of recycled water produced by IRWD; 3) to reduce diversions of sewage to Orange County Sanitation District; 4) to reduce recycled water discharges to the ocean; and 5) to meet or exceed the latest safety standards of State of California Department of Water Resources, Division of Safety of Dams.

Ms. Corey highlighted the project noting it will increase reservoir capacity from 500 acre-feet to 5,000 acre-feet. Additionally, the project will: 1) replace the existing 59-foot-high engineered dam with a new 136-foot-high engineered dam; 2) protect reservoir overtopping with the construction of a new spillway well; 3) provide a new treatment facility and inlet / outlet control building; 4) create onsite access and maintenance roads; 5) provide for wetland and riparian mitigation areas; and 6) provide a potential recreational facility including walking and running trails for the community.

Ms. Corey then reviewed the timeline for this project noting that pursuant to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and related guidelines, a Notice of Preparation of a Draft EIR was publicly circulated for 45 days on August 2, 2019, followed by a public scoping meeting that was held on August 21, 2019, providing the public and governmental agencies information on the CEQA process and providing opportunities to identify environmental issues and alternatives for consideration in the Draft EIR. She said that on March 17, 2021, IRWD filed a Notice of Completion of a Draft EIR for the Project with the Governor's Office of Planning and Research. A Notice of Availability of the Draft EIR was posted on March 19, 2021, and a virtual public meeting was held on April 21, 2021 where two comments were received from the audience. She said that the comments were in support of the environmental analysis included in the Draft EIR and included a request that the Final EIR include an inundation map with depth contours. She said that 11 letters providing comments on the Draft EIR were received during the public review period. The agencies that provided comments are

the Orange County Fire Authority, Irvine Unified School District, City of Irvine, California Department of Fish and Wildlife, Transportation Corridor Agencies, California Department of Transportation, Orange County Public Works, and the City of Newport Beach. In addition to these agencies, two Irvine residents provided comment letters and one comment letter was received from an IRWD Board Member. She said that staff and consultants from Environmental Science Associates (ESA) reviewed the written comments and prepared detailed responses to comments directed to any significant environmental issues. The comments, responses, and revisions to the Draft EIR text are included in a separate document comprised of additional chapters 8 through 11 which, together with the Draft EIR, comprise the Final EIR. The Final EIR is provided as an exhibit, the Findings and Facts in Support of Findings for the Project are provided as an exhibit along with the associated Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program provided as an exhibit. During the meeting, two comments were received via the Webex chat function in support of the project. Director Swan then provided a summary of objections for not moving forward with this project, and said he believed the Green Acres project would be a better alternative for recycled water storage to the proposed Syphon Reservoir project, and he said for those reasons that he would be voting no on this item.

There being no further comments, on <u>MOTION</u> by LaMar, seconded by McLaughlin, and carried by a vote of 4-1 (Reinhart, Withers, LaMar and McLaughlin voting aye, and Swan voting no), THE BOARD DIRECTED STAFF TO INCORPORATE INTO THE DRAFT FINDINGS AS PRESENTED IN THIS MEETING SUCH REVISIONS AS MAY BE NECESSARY TO CONFORM THE FINDINGS TO ANY INFORMATION THAT MAY BE RECEIVED AFTER PREPARATION OF SAID DRAFT AND PRIOR TO THIS ACTION, INCLUDING ANY CHANGES TO THE FINAL ENVIRONMENTAL IMPACT REPORT AND ANY COMMENTS FROM THE BOARD AT THIS MEETING; DIRECT THAT THE FINDINGS, AS SO REVISED, BE ATTACHED TO THE BELOW-MENTIONED RESOLUTION, AND ADOPTED THE FOLLOWING RESOLUTION BY TITLE:

GROUNDWATER BANKING JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY CASH CALL FUNDING APPROVAL

Using a PowerPoint presentation, General Manager Cook provided highlight of the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage project noting that: 1) the Proposition 1 Water Storage Investment Program (WSIP) is administered by the California Water Commission; 2) the Kern Fan Project is conditionally awarded \$87.8 million in WSIP funding; 3) the Kern Project includes a new conveyance from the California Aqueduct including a new turnout and a 10-mile canal, and has a 500 cubic foot per second capacity; 4) provides for 1,040 acres of recharge basins with an annual recharge capacity of 100,000 acre-feet and 100,000 acre-feet of storage capacity; and 5) provides for 12 recovery wells with a combined capacity up to 70 cubic feet per second.

Director of Treasury and Risk Management Jacobson reviewed the project location noting that the project requires the acquisition of approximately 1,280 acres of land in Kern County. Staff

from IRWD and Rosedale identified several suitable target properties to facilitate the future design and construction of the project, and the Groundwater Banking Joint Powers Authority Board approved acceptable price parameters for staff to negotiate each of the potential property purchases.

Director of Water Policy Weghorst provided a summary of the project status noting that: 1) staff is working with Department of Water Resources (DWR), Kern County Water Agency and Dudley Ridge Water District on hydraulic modeling on the California Aqueduct and the proposed new turnout, an ecosystem exchange concept and agreement terms, and the availability of Article 21 water; 2) the Environmental Impact Report was certified in December 2020 with DWR as lead on environmental compliance for the ecosystem pulse and State Water project operations; 3) 30 percent of the Feasibility report is in progress; 4) the request for proposal for design is expected to be released in August 2021; 5) a project update will be provided to the California Water Commission in August 2021; 6) the California Water Commission hearing is scheduled for November 2021 for continued grant eligibility; and 7) the property acquisition is in process. He further reviewed the project schedule.

General Manager Cook reported that late last week staff received, after the Board agenda was posted, an expense of \$267,000, and asked to amend the motion to clarify approvals for such items that have previously been approved during the budget process by the Board. There being no objection to this amendment, on MOTION by Withers, seconded by Swan and unanimously carried, THE BOARD APPROVED THE FUNDING OF THE GROUNDWATER BANKING JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY'S (GBJPA) CASH CALL IN THE AMOUNT OF \$450,000 AND AUTHORIZED STAFF TO TRANSFER FUNDS IN THE AMOUNT OF \$450,000 FROM IRWD TO THE GBJPA BANK ACCOUNT TO INITIATE THE LAND ACQUISITION PROCESS, AND THAT THE BOARD AUTHORIZED THE GENERAL MANAGER TO PAY ALL CASH CALLS RELATED TO THE APPROVED GBJPA CAPITAL AND OPERATING BUDGET, EXCEPT FOR LAND ACQUISITION CASH CALLS AND CASH CALLS FOR DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION CONTRACTS THAT EXCEED THE DELEGATION OF AUTHORITY AMOUNT OF THE IRWD GENERAL MANAGER.

OTHER BUSINESS

GENERAL MANAGER'S REPORT

General Manager Cook reported that there were no recent new COVID-19 cases. He updated the Board on customer billing noting that the outstanding debt is at \$2.6 million.

Mr. Cook said that this Thursday he is participating in an OCWD webinar on the drought condition along with panelists Dan Denham from SDCWA, James Bodnar from MWD, and Mike Markus from OCWD.

COMMUNITY UPDATES

Consultant Newell said that the pre-fire meeting was rescheduled for August 8. Director Withers said that he would be attending this meeting.

DIRECTORS' COMMENTS

Director LaMar reported on his attendance at MWDOC's Water Policy Forum and Dinner, an ACWA Region 3 event, an MWRP and San Joaquin Marsh tour with Senator David Min, a Southern California Water Coalition meeting, and an NWRA Western water webinar.

Director McLaughlin reported on her attendance at an ACWA Region 3 event.

Director Swan reported on his attendance at his normal meetings including a MWDOC Administration and Finance Committee meeting, a MWDOC Water Policy Forum and Dinner, a Groundwater Banking JPA Board meeting, a WACO Planning Committee meeting, an OCWA monthly meeting, and a Southern California Water Coalition meeting. He further commented that Board members would occasionally like to be in contact with community leaders, and asked that when this occurs, to be included in these opportunities.

Director Withers reported on his attendance at a MWDOC Water Policy Forum and dinner meeting, and an OCWA monthly meeting. He noted upcoming meetings including NWRI and OCSD meetings.

Director Reinhart reported on his attendance at an OCWD Water Issues Committee meeting, a MWDOC Water Policy Forum and Dinner, and a South Orange County Agencies group meeting.

2021 LEGISLATIVE AND REGULATORY UPDATE

SUMMARY:

This report provides an update on the 2021-2022 legislative session, regulatory issues, and IRWD priorities. As legislation and regulations develop, staff will provide updates and recommendations to the Water Resources Policy and Communications Committee and the Board, as appropriate.

Staff recommends the Board receive and file this report.

BACKGROUND:

The California State Assembly and Senate will return from summer recess on August 16, 2021. With less than one month left in the first year of the 2021-2022 Regular Legislative Session after the Legislature returns, fiscal committees have until August 27 to meet and report bills to the floor. The last day for each house to pass bills in this year is September 10, which is the day the interim legislative recess begins. The Governor has until October 10 to sign or veto legislation passed by the Legislature this year. The 2021-2022 Regular Legislative Session will resume on January 3, 2022.

A copy of the 2021 Legislative Matrix is provided as Exhibit "A". Links to the bills discussed below are included within each discussion unless a separate exhibit is noted.

State Budget Update:

Governor's Expanded Drought Emergency Proclamation:

On July 8, Governor Newsom expanded the state of emergency that he had initially proclaimed related to the drought. The latest proclamation extends the drought state of emergency to the counties of Inyo, Marin, Mono, Monterey, San Luis Obispo, San Mateo, Santa Barbara, Santa Clara, and Santa Cruz. Fifty of California's 58 counties are now under the drought state of emergency. The eight counties that are still not under the drought state of emergency are San Francisco and seven Southern California counties.

The July 8 proclamation finds that since May, California's water supplies continue to be severely depleted. In addition, the latest proclamation included:

- Encouraging local agencies to coordinate the use of their available supplies;
- Encouraging local agencies to substitute an alternative supply of groundwater from existing wells for a portion of surface water that the local agency is otherwise entitled to use:

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• Requiring the State Water Resources Control Board to consider modifying requirements for reservoir releases or diversion limitations to conserve water upstream later in the year;

- Requiring the State Board to expeditiously consider water transfers requests;
- Requiring the State Board to consider emergency regulations to curtail water diversions;
- Requiring the State Board to evaluate the minimum instream flows and other actions needed to protect fish;
- Requiring specified state agencies to assist local agencies with identifying acute drinking water shortages; and
- Requiring the Department of Water Resources (DWR), in consultation with the State Board, to identify and coordinate actions to mitigate drought-related fisheries impacts.

Governor's Executive Order Calling on Californians to Conserve Water:

On the same day that the Governor signed the proclamation expanding the drought state of emergency, he also signed an executive order, Executive Order N-10-21, calling on all Californians to voluntarily reduce their water use by 15 percent from their 2020 levels.

The Executive Order finds that conservation actions taken now by Californians will provide greater resilience if the drought continues into future years but acknowledges that local water suppliers have made investments in water recycling, stormwater capture and reuse, groundwater storage and other strategies to improve resilience. The Executive Order also cites measures that Californians can take to save water and money, including water efficient landscape irrigation, finding and fixing leaks, and installing water-efficient showerheads and taking shorter showers.

The Executive Order directs the DWR to monitor hydrologic conditions and orders the State Board to monitor progress toward achieving a 15 percent reduction in statewide urban water use as compared to 2020 use. The Executive Order indicates that the monitoring data tracked by DWR and the State Board will be used as ongoing indicators of water supply risk that may inform future drought response actions.

The California Water and Wastewater Arrearage Payment Program:

On July 15, AB 148 (Committee on Budget) was passed by the Legislature. AB 148, a lengthy budget trailer bill, provides the statutory framework for implementation of the budget items related public resources that were funded by the Budget Act of 2021. The bill also established the California Water and Wastewater Arrearage Payment Program, which will be funded with the \$985 million appropriated to the State Board by Budget Act of 2021 for outstanding customer water and wastewater debt.

The California Water and Wastewater Arrearages Program authorizes the State Board to reimburse community water systems for reported arrearages and water enterprise revenue shortfalls. If there are excess funds after addressing those funding needs, the program permits the State Board to provide funding to wastewater treatment provider for wastewater bill arrearages and shortfalls with the remaining funds.

Consent Calendar: 2021 Legislative and Regulatory Update

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AB 148 requires the State Board, within 90 days of receiving the funding, to survey community water systems to determine statewide arrearages that have accumulated and water enterprise revenue shortfalls that have occurred during the "COVID-19 pandemic bill relief period." The bill defines the relief period as March 4, 2020, to June 15, 2021. The survey results will be used to determine the total amount of residential and commercial arrearages. The funding will then be distributed to community water systems in the amount they report, or if there are insufficient funds to cover all outstanding COVID-19-related arrearages on a proportional basis based on the reported arrearages.

Those residential and commercial customer bills that are 60 days or more past due as of June 15, 2021, may be eligible for debt assistance under the program; however, the State Board will establish guidelines for prioritizing residential water customers and customers with the largest arrearages. Once the State Board distributes the funding, a community water system will have 60 days to apply the funding as bill credits to eligible customers.

The State Board is required to begin distributing funds no later than November 1, 2021, and to complete the distribution of funds no later than January 31, 2022.

AB 148 also provides that a community water system that has received funding under the program shall not discontinue water service due to nonpayment before the later of September 30, 2021, or the date set by the system for a customer to enroll in a payment plan. Community water systems are required by the legislation to send a notice to customers with arrearages. The notice must include information on how to enroll in a payment plan and inform the customer that they have 30 days from the date of the notice to enroll in a plan.

The State Board is working to establish the framework for implementing this program and to fill in the details that were not addressed in the legislation.

2021 State Legislative Update on Other Bills of Interest to IRWD:

Staff will also provide an oral update to the Committee on any new developments related to the following:

- SB 222 (Dodd, D-Napa) Water Rate Assistance Program: SB 222 would establish a Water Rate Assistance Program administered by the Department of Community Services and Development to provide drinking water and wastewater bill assistance to low-income ratepayers and ratepayers experiencing economic hardship. SB 222 is currently in the Assembly Appropriations Committee. IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on SB 222;
- SB 323 (Caballero, D-Salinas) Legal Action on Water and Sewer Service Rates: SB 323 proposes to establish a 120-day statute of limitations for challenging water and sewer rates. SB 323 is on the Assembly Appropriations Committee. IRWD currently has a "support" position on SB 323; and
- Other legislation matters of interest to the District.

2021 Federal Legislative Update:

On August 4, 2021, staff updated the Water Resources Policy and Communications Committee on these efforts and the ongoing efforts related to positioning the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project for federal funding, and other federal proposals of interest to the District.

LAKE FOREST 16-INCH ZONE C RECYCLED WATER PIPELINE IN VISTA TERRACE AND ZONE B TO C PUMP STATION PIPING IMPROVEMENTS FINAL ACCEPTANCE

SUMMARY:

The Lake Forest 16-Inch Zone C Recycled Water Pipeline in Vista Terrace and Zone B to C Pump Station Piping Improvements project is complete. IRWD's contractor Paulus Engineering completed the required work and all punch list items. The project has received final inspection and acceptance of construction is recommended.

BACKGROUND:

Staff completed an evaluation to identify ways to increase operational flexibility and improve water quality in the Lake Forest Zone C recycled water system, which can receive its water supply from the Los Alisos Water Recycling Plant (LAWRP) and Santa Margarita Water District's (SMWD) Upper Oso Reservoir. The evaluation resulted in a recommendation to cover the existing Zone B East Reservoir, establish a closed-loop Zone C distribution system with water supplied primarily from LAWRP, and construct a bi-directional metered interconnection with SMWD that can be used to transfer recycled water between IRWD and SMWD as needed.

The installation of the cover is complete, and IRWD is proceeding with construction of a new interconnection with SMWD and a new pump station to establish the closed-loop Zone C distribution system. This project included construction of the Zone C pipeline needed to create the closed-loop system and construction of various piping laterals into the site of the new Zone B to C pump station.

Staff completed the design in July 2020, and Paulus Engineering was awarded the construction contract on August 25, 2020. Paulus Engineering completed construction of all improvements on July 27, 2021. A summary of construction change orders is provided as Exhibit "A".

In Change Order No. 2, staff directed the contractor to make repairs to two of the Santiago Aqueduct Commission's Baker Pipeline Rectifiers. The rectifiers, which are an important element of the Baker Pipeline's cathodic protection system, were damaged in the Bond Fire and it was important for this facility to be repaired quickly. The cost of this work, shown in Exhibit "A" at \$79,668.75, accounted for most of the change order expenses associated with the Project. (Note that without this additional work, total change orders for the project would have amounted to 7.24% of the original contract amount.) The costs incurred by IRWD to repair the rectifiers on behalf of the Santiago Aqueduct Commission were reimbursed by the Commission to IRWD.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

Project 11236 is included in the FY 2021-22 Capital Budget. The existing budget is sufficient to fund the final payment for the project.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE:

This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and in conformance with California Code of Regulation, Title 14, Chapter 3, Section 15282 in that the installation of new pipeline or maintenance, repair restoration, removal, or demolition of an existing pipeline as set forth in Section 21080.21 of the Public Resources Code, as long as the project does not exceed one mile in length. This project is also exempt per Section 15301(b) which provides exclusion for minor alteration of public facilities. A Notice of Exemption for the project was filed with the County of Orange on December 11, 2019.

GROUNDWATER BANKING JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY CASH CALL FUNDING APPROVAL

SUMMARY:

On August 3, 2021, the Groundwater Banking Joint Powers Authority (GBJPA) Board of Directors authorized its Treasurer to make a cash call to fund escrow for the estimated final closing costs of a planned land purchase for the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project. The GBJPA Board approval included a cash call of \$2,500,000 each from IRWD and the Rosedale-Rio Bravo Water Storage District for a total funding of \$5,000,000. Staff recommends the IRWD Board approve the cash call request and authorize the transfer of \$2,500,000 from IRWD to the GBJPA upon the approval of due diligence findings by the GBJPA Board.

BACKGROUND:

In April 2020, IRWD and Rosedale executed a Joint Powers Agreement to develop and administer the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project and create the Groundwater Banking Joint Powers Authority. The project requires the acquisition of approximately 1,280 acres of land in Kern County. Staff from IRWD and Rosedale have identified several properties that could be suitable to incorporate into the project, and the GBJPA Board has approved price parameters for staff to negotiate each of the potential property purchases.

Funding for Land Acquisition:

The GBJPA has completed negotiations with one landowner and will soon open escrow on the first project property. The price and terms for the property were approved by the GBJPA Board in Closed Session. The subject property will provide nearly 150 acres for the project. If the subject property is determined to be suitable following the due diligence study (expected to be completed in October 2021), staff will provide the findings to the GBJPA Board and likely recommend approval to fund the purchase and acquire the property. At that time, the recommended cash call would be made to complete the purchase. If the GBJPA Board determines that a property is not suitable for the project, the escrow will be canceled, and any deposit will be refunded.

At its meeting on August 3, 2021, the GBJPA Board authorized its Treasurer to make a cash call of \$5,000,000 (\$2,500,000 each from IRWD and Rosedale) to fund the purchase of the property. Staff recommends the IRWD Board approve the funding of the GBJPA's requested cash call from IRWD in the amount of \$2,500,000 and authorize staff to transfer funds from IRWD to the GBJPA following the GBJPA Board's approval of due diligence findings.

AGREEMENT REGARDING TRANSFER OF APPLICANT STATUS
FOR PROPOSITION 1 WATER STORAGE INVESTMENT PROGRAM FUNDING TO THE
GROUNDWATER BANKING JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY

SUMMARY:

In August 2017, IRWD and Rosedale-Rio Bravo Water Storage District, jointly applied to the California Water Commission (CWC) for Proposition 1 Water Storage Investment Program (WSIP) funding for the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project (Kern Fan Project). The current amount of funding conditionally awarded to the project by the CWC is \$87.8 million. In April 2020, Rosedale and IRWD jointly formed the Groundwater Banking Joint Powers Authority (GBJPA) to plan, design, construct, operate and implement the Kern Fan Project. In order for the GBJPA to receive the WSIP funding awarded to the Kern Fan Project, the applicant status needs to be transferred from IRWD and Rosedale to the GBJPA. Staff recommends the Board authorize the General Manager to execute an agreement, subject to non-substantive changes, with Rosedale and the GBJPA to transfer the CWC application and the conditional WSIP funding award to the GBJPA and authorize staff to request approval of the transfer by the CWC.

BACKGROUND:

The Kern Fan Project will construct a regional water bank in the Kern Fan Sub-basin to recharge and store up to 100,000 acre-feet of surface water during wet periods that would otherwise be lost to the ocean. The project will provide multiple benefits, including increased water supply reliability to IRWD and Rosedale, as well as public ecosystem benefits in the Sacramento-San Joaquin River Delta and creation of intermittent wetlands during recharge periods.

IRWD and Rosedale, as a joint applicant, submitted an application in 2017 for WSIP funding for the Kern Fan Project. The CWC conditionally awarded the project \$68.7 million based on the project's expected public benefits and available WSIP funding. Additional WSIP funding became available in late 2020 as a result of the withdrawal of a WSIP application for another project. In January 2021, the CWC increased the conditional funding award for the Kern Fan Project to \$87.8 million based on the project's maximum eligible funding amount associated with the expected public benefits.

Funding Compliance Requirements:

To remain eligible for the conditional funding, WSIP applicants must demonstrate compliance with the following requirements by January 1, 2022:

- Completion of a Draft Environmental Impact Report (EIR);
- Demonstration of funding commitments for 75% of the non-public project costs; and
- Completion of a Feasibility Report.

Consent Calendar: Agreement Regarding Transfer of Applicant Status for Proposition 1 Water Storage Investment Program Funding to the Groundwater Banking Joint Powers Authority August 9, 2021

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On behalf of the GBJPA, staff from both IRWD and Rosedale will demonstrate Kern Fan Project compliance with these requirements at the meeting of the CWC in November 2021.

Transfer of Applicant Status:

In 2020, Rosedale and IRWD formed the GBJPA for the purpose of developing and implementing the Kern Fan Project. In order for the GBJPA to be the beneficiary of the WSIP funding, Rosedale and IRWD need to formally transfer the WSIP application and conditional funding award to the GBJPA and receive approval of the transfer from the CWC. Completing the transfer prior to the November 2021 meeting of the CWC will facilitate the next steps in the funding eligibility process. An agreement between IRWD, Rosedale and the GBJPA to transfer the WSIP application and funding to the GBJPA is provided as Exhibit "A".

On August 3, 2021, the GBJPA Board adopted a resolution authorizing the GBJPA to assume the status of applicant for the Kern Fan Project and authorized the GBJPA to execute the agreement to transfer the applicant status with Rosedale and IRWD. Staff recommends that IRWD execute the agreement with Rosedale and the GBJPA to transfer the CWC application and conditional WSIP funding award to the GBJPA and authorize staff to request approval of the transfer by the CWC.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

Upon full execution of the agreement provided in Exhibit "A" and approval of the CWC, the Proposition 1 WSIP application and conditional funding award for the Kern Fan Project in the amount of \$87.8 million would be transferred from IRWD and Rosedale to the GBJPA.

Agreement Regarding Transfer of Applicant Status

Proposition 1 Water Storage Investment Program Funding

This Agreement Regarding Transfer of Applicant Status for Proposition 1 WSIP Funding ("Agreement") is between the IRVINE RANCH WATER DISTRICT, a California water district, ("IRWD"), ROSEDALE RIO BRAVO WATER STORAGE DISTRICT, a California water storage district, ("RRB") and GROUNDWATER BANKING JOINT POWERS AUTHORITY, a California joint powers authority ("GBJPA"); and is effective as of ________, 2021 ("Effective Date"). IRWD, RRB and GBJPA are sometimes collectively referred to as the "Parties" or individually referred to as a "Party."

Recitals

- A. WHEREAS, Rosedale-Rio Brave Water Storage District ("RRB") is a public agency organized in accordance with the California Water Storage District Law (Division 14, commencing with §39000 of the California Water Code) for the purpose of acquiring, storing, distributing, and replenishing water supplies within its boundaries in Kern County, California.
- B. WHEREAS, Irvine Ranch Water District ("IRWD") is a public agency organized in accordance with the California Water District Law (Division 13, commencing with §34000 of the California Water Code) to provide water services and certain other services. IRWD's powers and purposes include the acquisition within or outside the district in the State of all necessary property, water, and water rights for the production, storage, transmission, and distribution of water for irrigation, domestic, industrial, and municipal purposes and to provide and sell such water at wholesale and retail to customers within its boundaries in Orange County, California.
- C. WHEREAS, both RRB and IRWD entered into an agreement on July 1, 2020 to establish a joint powers authority to pursue and develop the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project ("Project").
- D. WHEREAS, through the Project, the Parties seek to develop a regional water bank in the Kern County Groundwater Sub-basin of the San Joaquin Valley Groundwater Basin in Kern County. The Project would recharge and store up to 100,000 acre-feet of water during periods when surface water is abundant.
- E. WHEREAS, IRWD and RRB filed an application with the California Water Commission ("Commission") under the Water Storage Investment Program ("WSIP") established pursuant to Proposition 1, the Water Quality, Supply and Infrastructure Improvement Act of 2014, for funding of the Project.

- F. The Commission has granted a maximum conditional WSIP eligibility determination of \$87,801,500 to IRWD and RRB for the Project.
- G. WHEREAS, following the conditional funding award, IRWD and RRB jointly formed the GBJPA_to plan, design, construct, operate and otherwise implement the Kern Fan Groundwater Storage Project.
- H. Now, that the GBJPA is fully formed and functioning, IRWD and RRB are transferring and assigning various contract rights to the GBJPA to pursue the Project.
- I. Thus, now comes IRWD and RRB transfers the WSIP applicant status and all related application documents and materials to GBJPA; and IRWD and RRB are willing to transfer such applicant status and materials.

The parties agree as follows:

- 1. **COOPERATION IN TRANSFER OF WSIP APPLICATION.** IRWD and RRB will cooperatively perform such acts, and make, execute, and deliver such documents as may be reasonably necessary or required by the California Water Commission, to transfer the WSIP applicant status for the Project to GBJPA. All costs for the incurred for the production of documents or other materials will be the responsibility of GBJPA.
- 2. **COMMISSION APPROVAL.** This agreement is predicated on the Commission's approval of the Application transfer, and if such approval is not granted after good faith, reasonable efforts of the parties to comply with the terms of this Agreement, the Agreement may be terminated by either party in accordance with Section 5.
- 3. **RECITALS.** The Recitals to this Agreement are fully incorporated into and are integral parts of this Agreement.
- 4. **TERM OF AGREEMENT.** The term of this Agreement will remain in full force and effect until terminated as provided in Section 5, below.

5. TERMINATION.

- a. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by mutual written consent of the Parties.
- b. This Agreement may be terminated by either party if the Commission does not grant approval of the Application transfer after good faith, reasonable efforts to obtain such transfer approval within six months of the Effective Date.

- c. This Agreement may be terminated by GBJPA if it ceases to pursue or elects not to receive any of the WSIP funding for which IRWD and RRB applied.
- 6. **INDEMNIFICATION.** Subsequent to the effective date of transfer of the WSIP application by the Commission, if at all, ("Transfer Date"), GBJPA accepts all liabilities and responsibilities associated with the WSIP application occurring after the Transfer Date and agrees to indemnify and defend IRWD and RRB, its successors, and assigns against any claims made against IRWD and RRB arising out of the WSIP application or this Agreement after the Transfer date. IRWD and RRB accept all liabilities and responsibilities associated with the WSIP application occurring prior to the Transfer Date and agrees to indemnify and defend GBJPA, its successors, and assigns against any claims made against GBJPA arising out of the WSIP application prior to the Transfer Date. Each Party's obligations under this section will survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Agreement until action against the indemnified parties for the matter indemnified is fully and finally barred by the applicable statue of limitations or statue of repose. This section will survive any termination of Agreement affected after the Transfer Date.
- 7. **ATTORNEY'S FEES AND COSTS.** If any action at law or in equity is necessary to enforce or interpret the terms of this Agreement, the prevailing party will be entitled to reasonable attorneys' fees and costs in addition to any other relief to which such party may be entitled.
- 8. **SEVERABILITY.** This Agreement is subject to all applicable laws and regulations. If any provision of this Agreement is found by any court or other legal authority, or is agreed by the parties to be, in conflict with any code or regulation governing its subject matter, only the conflicting provision shall be considered null and void. If the effect of nullifying any conflicting provision is such that a material benefit of the Agreement to either party is lost, the Agreement may be terminated at the option of the affected party. In all other cases the remainder of the Agreement will continue in full force and effect.
- 9. **FURTHER ASSURANCES:** Each Party agrees to execute any additional documents and perform any further acts that may be reasonably required to effect the purposes of this Agreement.
- 10. **CONSTRUCTION:** This Agreement reflects the contributions of all undersigned parties and accordingly the provisions of Civil Code section 1654 will not apply to address and interpret any alleged uncertainty or ambiguity.
- 11. **HEADINGS:** Section headings are provided for organizational purposes only and do not in any manner affect the scope, meaning or intent of the provisions under the headings.

- 12. **NO THIRD-PARTY BENEFICIARIES INTENDED:** Unless specifically set forth, the Parties to this Agreement do not intend to provide any other party with any benefit or enforceable legal or equitable right or remedy.
- 13. **WAIVERS:** The failure to either Party to insist on strict compliance with any provision of this Agreement shall not be considered a waiver of any right to do so, whether for that breach or any subsequent breach. The acceptance by either party of either performance or payment shall not be considered to be a waiver of any preceding breach of the Agreement by the other party.

THE UNDERSIGNED AUTHORIZED REPRESENTATIVES of the parties have executed this Agreement as of the effective date set forth above.

RESOLUTION REGARDING AN APPLICATION FOR WATER RECYCLING FUNDING FOR THE SYPHON RESERVOIR IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

SUMMARY:

The State Water Resources Control Board continuously accepts financial assistance applications for the planning, design, and construction of recycled water projects under the Water Recycling Funding Program. Funding for the program can be available through bond-related grant funding, loans through the Clean Water State Revolving Fund (CWSRF), or a combination of both. In the event that grant funding becomes available, staff is preparing an application for the Syphon Reservoir Improvement Project, which will be considered by the State Board for placement on its fundable project list. Staff recommends the Board adopt a resolution authorizing the General Manager to apply for and accept grant funding from the State Water Resources Control Board under the Water Recycling Funding Program for the planning, design, and construction of the Syphon Reservoir Improvement Project.

BACKGROUND:

The Water Recycling Funding Program is administered by the State Board Division of Financial Assistance. The program supports the State Board's water recycling policy and provides funding for water recycling projects that offset or augment state or local fresh water supplies and for water recycling research. The State Board continually accepts applications for funding from the program for water recycling projects. Eligible costs include the planning, design and construction of recycled water treatment facilities, storage facilities, pumping facilities, and groundwater recharge facilities. The Water Recycling Funding Program currently funds up to 35 percent of the reasonable estimated construction cost up to a maximum established by the State Board. The current maximum funding award is limited to \$5 million per project.

All new projects submitted under the Water Recycling Funding Program that qualify as a priority project and meet all other eligibility requirements will be added to the State Board's fundable project list. Currently, only loan funding is available through Fiscal Year 2021-22. Any bond-related grants that may become available would also be administered under the Water Recycling Funding Program.

Application for Syphon Reservoir Improvement Project:

Staff is preparing a financial assistance application for the Syphon Reservoir Improvement Project to be considered for placement on the State Board's fundable project list in the event that grant funding becomes available. As part of the application process, the State Board requires that a resolution be adopted by an applicant's governing body. The resolution must designate an authorized representative to sign and file documents pertaining to the funding application and authorize submission of the funding application. Staff recommends the Board adopt the

FISCAL IMPACTS:

The Syphon Reservoir Improvement Project (Project 03808) is included in the FY 2021-21 and FY 2022-23 Capital Budget, adopted on April 26, 2021. On February 5, 2021, the Board approved a budget and Expenditure Authorization in the amount of \$146,000,000 for the design, public outreach, environmental compliance and permitting work associated with the project.

ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE:

This project is subject to CEQA and in conformance with California Code of Regulations Title 14, Chapter 3, Article 6, a Notice of Intent to adopt an Environmental Impact Report (EIR) was filed with the County of Orange on March 19, 2021. Pursuant to State Guideline § 15073, the Draft EIR was made available for public review from March 19, 2021, through May 18, 2021. The Final EIR was certified by IRWD Board of Directors at its July 26, 2021, meeting. A Notice of Determination was filed with the Orange County Clerk-Recorder and the California State Clearinghouse on July 27, 2021.

The Board of Directors of Irvine Ranch Water District therefore resolves as follows:

Section 1. IRWD's General Manager or his designee (the "Authorized Representative") is hereby authorized and directed to sign and file, for and on behalf of IRWD, a Financial Assistance Application under the WRFP for a grant from the State Water Resources Control Board for the planning, design, and construction of the Syphon Reservoir Improvement Project.

<u>Section 2.</u> The Authorized Representative is hereby authorized to provide any assurances, certifications, and commitments required for the Financial Assistance Application, and is authorized to execute a financial assistance agreement from the State Water Resources Control Board and any related amendments or changes.

Section 3. The Authorized Representative is hereby authorized to represent IRWD in carrying out IRWD's responsibilities under the financial assistance agreement, including certifying disbursement requests on behalf of IRWD and certifying compliance with applicable state and federal laws.

EDUCATIONAL AGREEMENT WITH DISCOVERY CUBE ORANGE COUNTY

SUMMARY:

Since 2007, IRWD has collaborated with Discovery Cube Orange County to create and implement meaningful water education programming for schoolchildren throughout the District's service area. Over the course of this 14-year partnership, these IRWD-sponsored elementary school assemblies, presentations, and field trips to the San Joaquin Marsh have educated more than 120,000 local students about the importance of water in our lives, and the need to use it wisely.

The proposed two-year agreement with Discovery Cube for Fiscal Years (FY) 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 would continue the successful educational program while allowing for a scalable in-person / virtual hybrid model that continues the partnership's longstanding assemblies and field trips, leverages the success of virtual programming in 2020-2021, and combines the two in order to provide the best of both opportunities for students. Staff recommends the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a Professional Services Agreement, with a total cost of \$412,822.60 over a two-year period, with Discovery Cube Orange County to implement educational programs for FY 2021-2022 and FY 2022-2023.

BACKGROUND:

IRWD first formed a partnership for water education with Discovery Cube (formerly Discovery Science Center) in 2007. The partnership was renewed in three-year increments until 2019-2020, when the Board of Directors approved a two-year term covering 2019-2020 and 2020-2021 to better align the program with the District's two-year budgeting process.

In 2020-2021, the District worked with Discovery Cube to establish online and virtual resources to continue water educational outreach during the COVID-19 pandemic. Live and pre-recorded virtual workshops were offered, along with digital tools such as workbooks, lab activities and digital programming that included the San Joaquin Marsh 360 Experience. The digital material, combined, yielded 121,055 visits and views in one year.

Plans for the next two years call for a hybrid model of in-person and virtual learning that includes the features listed below, and as outlined in Discovery Cube's proposal, which is provided as Exhibit "A". These features will be made available to all schools within the IRWD service area. The menu of options can be tailored to address the student health guidelines of each campus and classroom.

In-person Programming:

• School Assemblies: Students in kindergarten through fourth grade participate in assembly-style programming that teaches grade-specific, Next Generation Science

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Standard-aligned content that builds year over year. Hand-held keypads and interactive skits provide hands-on learning opportunities that are fun and engaging, and

• Water Quality Lab and Field Trips: In this two-part program for fifth-graders, students can attend a workshop at their schools to learn about water quality testing. The second day of the program takes the students on a field trip to IRWD's San Joaquin Marsh where they tour the ponds, learn about the Michelson Water Recycling Project and perform tests for dissolved oxygen with samples collected from the San Diego Creek. Water conservation kits are also distributed to these students for use in their homes.

Virtual Programming:

- Virtual Workshops and Presentations: Students in kindergarten through fourth grade
 participate in online workshops and/or presentations that teach grade-specific, Next
 Generation Science Standard-aligned content that builds year over year. Pre-recorded
 content is accessible via the Discovery Cube website, including a variety of learning tools
 such as workbooks and activities. Live on-line events will be scheduled as well, bringing
 students in the classroom and those learning at home together in one virtual real time
 experience;
- San Joaquin Marsh 360 Experience: This digital adventure takes students on a virtual tour and exploration of the Marsh, where they click on searchable data points to learn more about the Natural Treatment System, and plants and animals that make their home at the Marsh. This project replaced in-person Marsh field trips during COVID-19, and will continue to be used as a virtual tool that can also be used to enhance in-person field trips once they resume; and
- Recycled Water/Michelson Water Recycling Plant Experience: This 360-interactive experience will provide sixth-, seventh- and eighth-grade students an in-depth discovery of the benefits, uses and treatment processes of recycled water. Like the San Joaquin Marsh 360 Experience developed in early 2021, this tool will enable students to learn about the benefits of recycled water while virtually exploring the Michelson plant, which is not normally open for tours with children. Several non-linear stops in the tour will allow students to choose their own path and explore the science of the water treatment and purification process through gamified interactions. This project is in the production phase and scheduled for completion in the fall.

FISCAL IMPACTS:

The cost of the elementary and middle school programs is \$412,822.60 over the two-year period and is included in the FY 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 operating budget. All Discovery Cube education programs will be funded from IRWD over-allocation funding.

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Irvine Ranch Water District Discovery Cube Orange County 2021-2023 Education Program Proposal

Context: During the public health crisis that COVID-19 caused around the globe, Discovery Cube took a forward-thinking approach and challenged its traditional methods of education to provide schools with the educational support they need. We created an all new website focused on student, teacher, and parent resources to help support them through virtual learning experiences. This allowed the Cube to focus on its own Cube-curated science videos, music videos, scientist interviews, and curriculum that has the same fun, interactive, and hands-on engagement for which the Cube is known and respected. Discovery Cube's educational program proposal for Irvine Ranch Water District newly proposed environmental program is based on this creative approach to water education.

Education Program Strategy: Discovery Cube Orange County (DCOC) is eager to continue to deliver our high-quality Next Generation Science Standards-aligned water efficiency programming to students throughout the Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) service area through our partnership. Water efficiency remains as urgent and relevant as ever, and we are committed to continuing this important work arm-in-arm with Irvine Ranch Water District – leveraging many of the virtual tools developed during the pandemic to establish a scalable, hybrid model of water education that will serve the District's water education goals as schools begin the transition to in-class instruction.

Given the still uncertain future of schools reopening in the fall, we propose to offer a program that can be delivered both virtually and in person so as to be accessible to all students and school classrooms in whichever format works best.





Content: Using Discovery Cube's new science sustainability curriculum, we will engage students in science exploration by focusing on California's unique environment as context for learning. Through a series of newly created Cube musical science videos, kid-friendly documentaries, and scientist spotlights, together with interactive presentations and handson activities, students will be immersed in a fun science program that is correlated with Next Generation Science Standards based on the Environmental Principals & Concepts. Sustainability topics include water conservation, how our water is transported to Southern California through natural and man-made devices, the water cycle, healthy ecosystems, water filtration, watersheds, recycled water, and groundwater.

Kindergarten through 2nd Grade: Through the power of science connections, music, and literature, students will experience fun-filled assemblies that will transform mindsets and teach new habits pertaining to environmental literacy. Learning will be assessed through questioning and observation. A brief description of each grade level is below:

Kindergarten – Saving Water: Students will learn about one of the most precious parts of our Southern California ecosystem – water! Through a science, music, and literature connection, students will investigate what it means to be water wise in order to conserve our limited water resources. During the assembly, students will work together with a Discovery Cube educator and use problem-solving skills to find ways to save water.

First Grade – Topography and Our Water: California's landscape is beautiful and diverse. Through a connection between science, music, and literature, students are taken on a journey to imagine what their life would be like without water. Understanding the unique topography of California will further student learning of how its landscape assists in bringing





water to us in the southern part of the state to supplement the water we have stored in underground wells and aquifers.

Second Grade – The Water Cycle: The Water Cycle is explored through literature and video with beautiful imagery to make the concept come alive for young learners. Numerous forms of water will be discovered from clouds to fog to frost, and in lazy marshes, churning rivers, and breaking waves; yet one thing remains similar – the cycle of water. Using descriptive terms and images throughout the assembly, students will be encouraged to participate in a skit focused on the unique characteristics of water.

3rd-4th Grade Program

Students will explore water sustainability topics as they understand their relationship with water and their ecosystem, identify local challenges, and appreciate their individual and community responsibility for the health of our planet. The program will also introduce students to careers with meaningful impact on the environmental industry. Learning will be assessed using interactive keypad technology. A brief description of each grade level is below:

Third Grade – Water Filtration: Students will learn about water filtration through the process of evaporation and underground filtration by watching a video and participating in an interactive assembly. They will be introduced to a variety of contaminates that can exist in our water, like bacteria and undesirable chemicals, and will be encouraged to help find solutions for cleaning our water supply for human consumption.

Fourth Grade – Moving Our Water: Students will be taken on a journey of how water is transported to our dry and arid environment in Southern California for all to use. While only 14% of the water in the IRWD service area is imported from outside the area, it helps supplement the well water, surface water, and recycled water we have. Students will be





introduced to the innovative solutions that have been created to assist us with living in a coastal desert ecosystem, such as the use of aqueducts, while understanding and celebrating the success of water efficiencies. Exploring water's voyage from the mountaintops to the coast will engage students in the engineering design process as they create a Rube Goldberg-type machine for the conveyance of water.

5th Grade Program

In this two-part program, students will discover the importance of chemistry in aquatic ecosystems and in the water recycling process. Students will perform tests for dissolved oxygen levels using professional lab equipment. They will also investigate pollutants, how they travel through the water, and how they affect our food chain.

The program consists of one workshop session at the school site, and a 2-hour field trip to the San Joaquin Marsh. Activities presented at the Marsh will guide students to understand the concepts of biomagnification and water quality. In addition to the in-person field trip, students will be introduced to the San Joaquin Marsh through a 360-degree interactive marsh experience.

When in-person field trips are not possible, Discovery Cube will continue to offer the San Joaquin Marsh tour as a virtual experience, utilizing the 360-degree experience and an online workshop format.

6th-8th Grade Program

Discovery Cube is in the process of creating a 360-interactive experience of IRWD's Michelson Water Recycling Plant. This experience will enable students to virtually explore inside of the Michelson Water Recycling Plant, which is not normally open for tours with children. During the companion education program, students will be greeted by a virtual host who will guide them along their journey as they learn how the water is cleaned and





recycled. There will be several non-linear stops in the tour, where students can choose their own path and explore the scientific specifics of the purification process through gamified interactions. As they progress, they will collect points, see their water become purified, and accrue a score. Ultimately, the interactive will culminate in a spotlight of IRWD's invention of the purple pipes. This program will be a virtual experience that is led by Discovery Cube staff, and lasts roughly 45 minutes to one hour. Development of this experience began during the 2020-21 contract period, and will continue through the first few months of this contract period. Discovery Cube intends to have the experience ready for students by the start of 2022 at the latest.

Delivery: Programming will take place in one of two ways:

Should a school be open to having outside educators visit campus, DCOC will teach the program in-class, as they have been doing since the start of this partnership.

For schools that are still participating in distance learning, DCOC will work with individual schools to set up their grade-specific programming. This will function very similar to how our in-person programs are booked. We will work with the school to assign a date and time that works best for them. These programs will take place over Microsoft Teams, which is a webinar platform, and will be for that specific school and grade level. At the assigned time, two DCOC educators will lead the students through the education program. We will adapt the length and content of the program slightly, accounting for the lack of keypad responders, but will use virtual polling to collect data. Should the schools have students on





campus periodically, DCOC will get hard copies of the booklets to the schools for distribution. Otherwise, DCOC will supply the school with a digital copy for students.

Summary: Discovery Cube is appreciative of the flexible and innovative nature of Irvine Ranch Water District in working with us to develop effective online tools that we will continue to use even after schools have transitioned to in-person learning and assemblies. These tools have given us flexibility to meet our student targets during through these uncertain times. As things continue to evolve, we will of course stay nimble and adapt to change as it comes. DCOC is also committed to ensuring that the Not to Exceed established in the original contract will remain.
