

#### PUBLIC HEARING

#### SEWER CHARGES IN IRWD'S NEWPORT NORTH AREA

#### **SUMMARY**:

On June 26, 2023, the Board adopted Rates and Charges effective July 1, 2024, which included monthly sewer charges of \$36.79 for a residential single-family home and \$25.70 per unit for multiple-family dwelling units. IRWD customers in Newport North will be charged the same rate, but the method of collection differs in that customers pay sewer fees on an annual basis by means of the County of Orange tax rolls.

#### BACKGROUND:

By adoption of Resolution No. 1987-45, the Board of Directors elected to have sewer charges for certain parcels of land located in the Newport North area collected on the tax roll together with IRWD's general taxes. This resolution directs the filing of a report, attached as Exhibit "A", containing a description of such parcels and the corresponding charges for each fiscal year. The recommended resolution for adopting the sewer charge report and authorizing the collection of sewer charges on the tax roll for IRWD's Newport North Area is attached as Exhibit "B".

On June 26, 2023, the Board adopted Rates and Charges effective July 1, 2024, which included monthly sewer charges of \$36.79 for a residential single-family home and \$25.70 per unit for multiple-family dwelling units in FY 2024-25.

#### Sewer Charges for IRWD's Newport North Customers

IRWD's Newport North customers are charged the IRWD Board-adopted sewer rate. They pay their sewer fees on an annual basis by means of the County of Orange tax rolls. In 2023, the previous monthly sewer charges of \$33.24 for a residential single-family home and \$23.10 per unit for multiple-family dwelling units were included in County tax rolls for IRWD's Newport North customers for the 12-month period of July 2023 to June 2024. The monthly sewer charges increased to \$36.79 for a residential single-family home and \$25.70 per unit for multiple-family dwelling units for Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25. The total assessment will be \$441.48 and \$308.40 for single-family home customers and multiple-family dwelling unit customers, respectively.

To implement these sewer charges for IRWD's Newport North customers, staff recommends that the Board conduct the Public Hearing, per Resolution No. 1987-45, and adopt the recommended resolution regarding the new sewer charges for these customers.

#### **FISCAL IMPACTS:**

The sewer rates charged in IRWD's Newport North are the same as any other area within the District, and therefore will be set at total assessment of \$441.48 for a residential single-family home, which is the equivalent of twelve months assessment of \$36.79 per month for FY 2024-25, and \$308.40 for multiple-family dwelling units, which is the equivalent of twelve months assessment of \$25.70 per month for FY 2024-25, respectively. The total sewer charges are the same rate as other IRWD customers, but the means of collection is different for the customers in Newport North.

This item is not a project as defined in the California Environmental Quality Act Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Section 15378.

#### RESOLUTION NO. 2024-9

#### RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF IRVINE RANCH WATER DISTRICT ADOPTING THE SEWER CHARGE REPORT AND AUTHORIZING COLLECTION OF SEWER CHARGES ON THE TAX ROLL FOR THE NEWPORT NORTH SERVICE AREA

Resolution No. 1987-45 was adopted on August 10, 1987. The Board of Directors of Irvine Ranch Water District ("IRWD") elected to have sewer charges for certain parcels collected on the tax roll each year in the same manner, by the same persons, and at the same time as, together with and not separately from, its general taxes, pursuant to Section 5473 et seq. of the California Health and Safety Code.

Pursuant to said Resolution, a report has been filed with the Secretary containing a description of such parcels and the corresponding charges for Fiscal Year 2024-25 and notice was given as required by law of a hearing on the report to be held on Monday, the 8th day of July 2024, at 5:00 p.m. (or as soon thereafter as is reasonably practicable) in the Board of Directors meeting room of IRWD, 15600 Sand Canyon Avenue, Irvine, California.

The duly noticed public hearing was held and all persons interested were given an opportunity to be heard concerning the report and to submit any objections or protests to the report.

The Board of Directors of IRWD does hereby RESOLVE, DETERMINE and ORDER as follows:

- <u>Section 1.</u> The Board of Directors hereby determines that protests to the report were not made by the owners of a majority of separate parcels of property described in the report.
- Section 2. The Board of Directors hereby adopts the report containing a description of the parcels for which charges for sewer service shall be collected on the tax roll and containing the amount of the charges for each parcel for the Fiscal Year 2024-25, computed in conformity with the schedule of rates and charges adopted by Resolution No. 2024-9. The report is provided as Exhibit "A" and is incorporated herein by this reference. Each charge set forth in Exhibit "A" is hereby determined to be adopted.
- Section 3. The Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to endorse on the report a statement that the report was adopted by this Board on July 8th, 2024, and to take whatever other action is required by the Auditor of the County of Orange in regard thereto in order to place the charges on the tax roll for the parcels described in the report.
- <u>Section 4</u>. The Secretary is hereby authorized and directed to file a copy of such report with the Auditor of the County of Orange.

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#### MINUTES OF REGULAR MEETING – JUNE 10, 2024

The regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) was called to order by President Reinhart at 5:00 p.m. on June 10, 2024 at the District offices, 15600 Sand Canyon Avenue, Irvine.

General Counsel Collins read into the record, per Government Code Section 54954.2(b)(2), the Board can take action on matters not in the published agenda "upon a determination by a two-thirds vote of the members of the legislative body present at the meeting, or, if less than two-thirds of the members are present, a unanimous vote of those members present, that there is a need to take immediate action and that the need for action came to the attention of the local agency subsequent to the agenda being posted as specified in subdivision (a)."

There is a need to take immediate action because the County is presently negotiating the lease extension and has indicated to IRWD that it intends to take action on the Counteroffer and Letter of Interest next week. The IRWD Board meeting agenda was posted on Thursday afternoon, and staff was not notified of the need to sign the concurrence to the counteroffer until after 5:37pm on Friday, June 7.

If the Board agrees to take action tonight, it will need to conduct two votes. The first vote is to make a unanimous vote that there is a need to take immediate action and that the need for action came to the attention of IRWD after the agenda was posted and after working hours on Friday.

If that vote carries, then the Board will consider whether to pass the recommended motion. This item will be heard as Agenda Item No. 13A.

On motion by LaMar, and seconded by Withers, the Board unanimously voted that there is a need to take immediate action and the item was added to the action calendar as Item No. 13A.

#### FISCAL IMPACTS:

As of May 31, 2024, the book value of the investment portfolio was \$388,918,908, with a 4.46% rate of return and a market value of \$386,499,602. Based on IRWD's March 31, 2024, quarterly real estate annualized investment rate of return of 15.18%, the weighted average return for the fixed income and real estate investments was 6.73%.

As of May 31, 2024, the outstanding principal amount of fixed and variable rate debt was \$585,895,000. The monthly weighted average all-in variable rate was 3.59%. Including IRWD's weighted average fixed rate bond issues of 3.73% and the negative cash accruals from fixed payer interest rate swaps, which hedge a portion of the District's variable rate debt, the total average debt rate was 3.71%.

Payroll ACH payments totaled \$3,687,424. Wire transfers, other ACH payments, and checks issued for debt service, accounts payable, payroll, water purchases, and voided checks for May totaled \$27,048,989.



## Irvine Ranch Water District Investment Portfolio Summary May 2024







## LUMP SUM PAYMENT OPTION FOR EMPLOYER CONTRIBUTIONS FOR FISCAL YEAR 2024-25 TO THE CALIFORNIA PUBLIC EMPLOYEES' RETIREMENT SYSTEM

### **SUMMARY:**

IRWD typically chooses to pay the Annual Unfunded Accrued Liability (UAL) "Prepayment Option" in order to reduce overall costs to the District. Following this past practice, staff recommends the Board approve a lump sum payment option for employer contributions to the California Public Employees' Retirement System (CalPERS) by making a one-time contribution of \$8,631,732 to CalPERS for IRWD's Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25.

### BACKGROUND:

The total minimum required employer contribution to CalPERS is the sum of the CalPERS Plan's Employer Normal Cost Rate (expressed as a percentage of payroll) plus the employer Unfunded Accrued Liability (UAL) contribution amount (billed monthly in dollars). Beginning in FY 2009-10, IRWD elected to utilize the lump sum payment option for the total minimum required employer contribution as the District benefits from not incurring interest expense at the assumed actuarial interest rate, which is currently 6.80%.

Beginning seven years ago, CalPERS changed its rules so that only the UAL portion of the employer contribution can be prepaid in full no later than July 31 of each year. The normal cost contributions for IRWD, estimated to be \$4.4 million, will be made as part of the bi-weekly payroll reporting process. CalPERS has indicated that IRWD's UAL lump sum payment for FY 2024-25 will be \$8,631,732, as shown in Exhibit "A". The total UAL cost of choosing the monthly payments option is approximately \$8,920,385. Therefore, choosing the lump sum payment option will save IRWD approximately \$288,653 this fiscal year.

### FISCAL IMPACTS:

The District's approved operating budget for FY 2024-25 includes normal and UAL employer contributions of \$14.0 million and repayment of replacement fund loan of \$0.5 million. The payments are consistent with the impacts identified in setting rates for FY 2024-25. The Operating Fund will fund this UAL lump sum payment.

## **Actuarial Assumptions**

In 2021, CalPERS completed its most recent asset liability management study incorporating actuarial assumptions and strategic asset allocation. In November 2021, the board adopted changes to the asset allocation that increased the expected volatility of returns. The adopted asset allocation was expected to have a long-term blended return that continued to support a discount rate assumption of 6.80%. The board also approved several changes to the demographic assumptions that more closely aligned with actual experience.

For more details and additional rationale for the selection of the actuarial assumptions, please refer to the CalPERS Experience Study and Review of Actuarial Assumptions report from November 2021 that can be found on the CalPERS website under: Forms and Publications. All actuarial assumptions (except the discount rates used for the accrued liability on a termination basis) represent an estimate of future experience rather than observations of the estimates inherent in market data.

### **Economic Assumptions**

### **Discount Rate**

The prescribed discount rate assumption, adopted by the board on November 17, 2021, is 6.80% compounded annually (net of investment and administrative expenses) as of June 30, 2022.

#### **Termination Liability Discount Rate**

The current discount rate assumption used for termination valuations is a weighted average of the 10-year and 30-year U.S. Treasury yields where the weights are based on matching asset and liability durations as of the termination date.

The accrued liabilities on a termination basis in this report are calculated using an observed range of market interest rates. This range is based on the lowest and highest 20-year Treasury bond observed during an approximate 19-month period from 12 months before the valuation date to seven months after. The 20-year Treasury bond has a similar duration to most plan liabilities and serves as a good proxy for the termination discount rate. The 20-year Treasury yield was 3.38% on June 30, 2022.

### CONSENT CALENDAR

### 2024 LEGISLATIVE AND REGULATORY UPDATE

### **SUMMARY:**

This report provides an update on the 2023-2024 legislative session, regulatory issues, and IRWD priorities. As legislation and regulations develop, staff will provide updates and recommendations to the Water Resources Policy and Communications Committee and the Board, as appropriate. Staff recommends the Board consider the following actions/positions:

- SB 1134 (Caballero, D-Merced) Surplus land: "SUPPORT IF AMENDED"; and
- AB 805 (Arambula, D-Fresno) Sewer service: disadvantaged communities: "WATCH".

### BACKGROUND:

The deadline for legislative measures to qualify for the November 5, 2024, general election was June 27 without the Legislature waiving the statute defining the deadline. July 3 will be the last day for policy committees to meet and consider bills. The Legislature will then commence its month-long Summer Recess and reconvene on August 5.

A copy of the 2024 Legislative Matrix is attached as Exhibit "A". Links to the bills discussed below are included within each discussion unless a separate exhibit is noted.

### 2024 State Legislative Update:

AB 805 (Arambula, D-Fresno) Sewer service: disadvantaged communities:

AB 805 would authorize the State Water Resources Control Board to require a sewer service provider for a sewer system that has the reasonable potential to cause a violation of water quality objectives, impair present or future beneficial uses of water or cause pollution, nuisance, or contamination of waters of the state to contract with an administrator designated or approved by the State Board.

The Board adopted a "seek amendments" position on AB 805 and authorized staff to seek amendments that would provide protections for an assuming sewer provider that are similar to those provided in existing law for assuming water providers. Working through the District's associations, staff advocated for such amendments, and the author amended the bill. The bill would now permit the State Board to require a failing sewer system to contract with an administrator but would not require another provider to assume the failing system. The bill also now contains a sunset of the State Board's powers. With these amendments, IRWD's associations have removed their opposition and staff now recommends that the Board adopt a "watch" position on the bill, as well.

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### SB 1134 (Caballero, D-Merced) Surplus land:

SB 1134 (Caballero) seeks to clarify and address issues of ambiguity in the Surplus Land Act (SLA). As amended, it would also require the Department of Housing and Community Development (HCD) to use the Administrative Procedures Act (APA) process when adopting regulations or guidelines related to the implementation of the SLA instead of the non-APA process provided for under existing law. The bill would also make a change in the disposal of exempt surplus land in Section 2 of the bill that was included in the bill due to a drafting error. The author has committed to correcting this error.

Staff recommends that the Board adopt a "support if amended" position on the bill, with the amendment sought being the removal of Section 2 related to exempt surplus land.

### SB-1255 (Durazo, D- Los Angeles) Public Water Systems: Needs Analysis:

SB 1255, as amended on June 19, would require the State Board to update its needs analysis of public water systems to include an assessment of the funds necessary to provide a 20 percent discount for low-income households served by community water systems with fewer than 3,000 service connections. It would also require public water systems with more than 3,300 connections to establish a water Low-Income Rate Assistance (LIRA) program that would:

- Be funded with voluntary contributions, which would be collected through water bills on an opt-out-only basis;
- Require the system to establish a recommended voluntary contribution amount on the bill
  of each ratepayer, other than ratepayers eligible for the program. The recommend
  contribution would be required to be set at a level sufficient to fund the discount to
  eligible ratepayers and pay for administrative costs; and
- Provide a bill credit to eligible ratepayers of no less than 20 percent of the water, and if present on the bill, wastewater charges for consumption of up the indoor water use standards association with "Making Conservation a California Way of Life."

IRWD currently has an "oppose unless amended" position on SB 1255, and staff is engaged in ongoing workgroup discussions with the Association of California Water Agencies (ACWA) and California Municipal Utilities Association (CMUA) on further amends needed to make the bill workable for retail water suppliers. Staff will update the Board on these discussions and the amendments the sponsors have agreed to make to the bill to date.

### Other 2024 State Legislative Updates:

Staff will also update to the Board on any new developments related to the following:

- AB 1827 (Papan, D-San Mateo) Local government: fees and charges: water: higher consumptive water parcels;
- AB 2149 (Connley, D-San Rafael) Gates: standards: inspection;
- SB 1218 (Newman, D-Fullerton) Emergency Water Supplies;

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• 2024-2025 State Budget;

- Climate resilience bonds; and
- Other legislative matters of interest to IRWD.

### Other 2024 State and Regional Regulatory Updates:

2023-2024 ORANGE COUNTY GRAND JURY REPORT RESPONSE TO "EMERGING OPPORTUNITIES IN SOUTH COUNTY WATER/WASTEWATER SERVICE"

#### **SUMMARY:**

During its 2023-2024 session, the Orange County Grand Jury (Grand Jury or OCGJ) examined water and wastewater service in South Orange County. On June 21, 2024, the Grand Jury released its findings on the subject in a report entitled "*Emerging Opportunities in South County Water/Wastewater Service*." The report identified four findings and two recommendations of which IRWD is required to respond to one finding and one recommendation.

Staff recommends that the Board authorize the General Manager to respond to the Presiding Judge, as required by the California Penal Code, and the Grand Jury.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

During its 2023-2024 session, the Grand Jury examined the 2021 consolidation of the City of San Juan Capistrano's (SJC) water and wastewater utility with Santa Margarita Water District (SMWD) to evaluate the challenges and benefits of consolidation. The Grand Jury then extended their examination to the interrelationship of water and wastewater in South Orange County.

The Grand Jury's stated reason for the collective examination was that:

"In 2023, public attention was drawn to the aftermath of the SMWD's 2021 annexation of the SJC water systems. Media reports cited SMWD officials claiming neglect under prior SJC management. News coverage also focused on proposed rate increases so excessive that they generated protests from some of the most severely impacted customers. This being the most recent water systems consolidation, OCGJ was curious about the overall process, pre-existing condition of city's water systems, and reasons underlying these major rate differences.

Additionally, with an interest in regional water matters, the OCGJ decided to extend its scope and examine the broader network of water and wastewater entities in South Orange County. The OCGJ identified a group of major water/wastewater providers that, through a long-standing JPA, manage and provide regional collection and treatment of wastewater to support their respective service areas. The OCGJ then undertook an investigation to assess the governance structure and operational effectiveness of this collaborative legal network. The OCGJ was particularly interested in the interrelationship of these water and wastewater providers and the prospect of future consolidations in South Orange County." (page 7)

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July 8, 2024

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The resulting report "Emerging Opportunities in South County Water/Wastewater Service" was issued on June 21, 2024. A copy of the report is attached as Exhibit "A".

#### **Grand Jury Report's Overarching Conclusions:**

After a case study of the SMWD consolidation with SJC and a case study of the South Orange County Wastewater Authority (SOCWA), the report concludes with a discussion on water consolidations that portrayed IRWD as an example and on wastewater system collaboration in South Orange County.

With regards to consolidations, the report states:

"In recent years, water districts have experienced the benefits of consolidation with one another, as evidenced by IRWD. It has successfully acquired five other agencies over the past twenty-seven years, including the Santa Ana Heights Mutual Water Company in 1997, Carpenter Irrigation District in 2000, Los Alisos Water District in 2001, Santiago County Water District in 2006, and the Orange Park Acres Mutual Water Company in 2008.

Irvine Ranch Water District's process involves a selective approach, emphasizing efficiencies and mutual benefits. It begins with a consolidation request to IRWD from the prospective water agency, followed by mutual agreement on terms, and then an application to LAFCO for their evaluation. Irvine Ranch Water District has a proven track record since 1997 of having successfully unified five providers benefiting 57,000 residents with improved water reliability and standardized rates. With extensive cash reserves, IRWD is poised to maintain and enhance its water systems over the next fifty years.

It is evident that past consolidations among water agencies have yielded positive outcomes by enhancing efficiencies and fostering mutual benefits through shared expertise and resources. With the multitude of water districts and the risk of financial strain comparable to SJC, future consolidations are not just probable but beneficial. Hence, it is imperative to draw lessons from past experiences. By reviewing the issues and concerns encountered by SMWD and by adopting the strategies employed by IRWD, there is an opportunity to improve the process for future consolidations." (pages 19-20)

IRWD is also mentioned on pages 4, 17, 25, 32, and 33 of the report and received a commendation in the report from the Grand Jury on page 21.

#### Required Responses to Findings and Recommendations:

Based on its investigation, the Grand Jury arrived at four findings (F1 through F4), and two recommendations (R1 and R2). In accordance with California Penal Code Sections 933 and 933.05, each agency affected by the findings is required to submit a response to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court. The District is required to respond to Finding F4 which states:

**Finding F4:** "There is currently no unified strategy for the future of water/wastewater provision in South Orange County."

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The District is also required to respond to Recommendations R2, which state:

**Recommendation R2:** "The OCGJ recommends that by January 1, 2025, LAFCO form a task force comprising representatives of affected water agencies to study the transformation of SOCWA and prepare a report on the future of water/wastewater in South Orange County. (F3, F4)"

A copy of the proposed response to the Grand Jury is attached as Exhibit "B".

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# SUMMARY

This Orange County Grand Jury (OCGJ) report examines the 2021 consolidation of the City of San Juan Capistrano's (SJC) water and wastewater utilities with the Santa Margarita Water District (SMWD). It sheds light on the challenges encountered and benefits achieved through consolidation. The reorganization revealed unforeseen infrastructure costs. Also, different rate structures between the combined systems resulted in a dramatic fire line service rate increase for non-residential customers that prompted protest from some of the affected ratepayers. Going forward, the lessons learned from the SMWD experience are relevant for future consolidations. Based on the findings presented in this report, the OCGJ recommends that the Orange County Local Agency Formation Commission (LAFCO) develop an ongoing practice of evaluating post-consolidation outcomes and public impacts.

Further, this OCGJ report delves into the interrelationship of water and wastewater in South Orange County. The OCGJ studied the South Orange County Wastewater Authority (SOCWA), one of the largest collaborations of wastewater service providers in the region. Disputes among its member agencies, including litigation, have strained relations causing a bureaucratic entanglement that hinders operational effectiveness. Proposals and negotiations are underway that could ultimately affect the status of its members and the realignment of treatment plants serving South Orange County.

SOCWA is a long-standing joint powers authority (JPA) that shares several wastewater facilities managed through agreements that are due to expire in 2030. Its continuance as a JPA is tenuous yet its regulatory function remains relevant. As such, the OCGJ recommends LAFCO form a task force comprising representatives from affected water agencies to study the transformation of SOCWA and prepare a report identifying the optimal future of water and wastewater systems in South Orange County.

Technologies, innovation, and increased State and federal funding are on the horizon for the water and resource recovery industry. The OCGJ finds an urgent need to unite the South Orange County water and wastewater agencies so that South Orange County is in a better position to seize the opportunities that lie ahead.

# **BACKGROUND**

Providing water and processing wastewater in Orange County has consistently captured the public's attention. Over the past 25 years, Grand Juries have issued 15 reports addressing various water-related challenges. Many of these reports emphasize the importance of consolidating water and wastewater agencies. Orange County is home to numerous governmental entities, including special districts and JPAs that oversee an array of countywide functions, particularly those related to water and wastewater service

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providers. Specifically, there are 29 retail water suppliers<sup>1</sup> in Orange County with their own independent governing boards and associated bureaucracies.

Previous OCGJs have raised concerns about the redundancy, laden costs, and complexity of public agencies for decades. Reports investigated the intricate web of independent special districts. Consolidating the large number of public agencies overseeing water and wastewater systems is a matter of significant concern.<sup>2</sup>

Over the past six decades, Orange County's history reflects a transformation from an agricultural hub to a thriving residential and commercial community. Rapid growth during this period caused a proliferation of water districts throughout the county. This resulted in an overabundance of water retailers operating within one of the geographically smallest counties in California.

In more recent times, water districts have found it necessary and advantageous to consolidate with other compatible public agencies. The Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) successfully acquired 5 water agencies in the last 27 years, with the most recent consolidation occurring in 2008.<sup>3</sup> The latest annexation within Orange County occurred in 2021 when the Santa Margarita Water District (SMWD) acquired the water and wastewater systems of the City of San Juan Capistrano (SJC) through annexation.

Additionally, the potential consolidation of Orange County Water District (OCWD) and Municipal Water District of Orange County (MWDOC)—the county's two major water wholesalers—is currently under review by the Orange County LAFCO. This is highlighted in the 2021-2022 OCGJ report titled "Water in Orange County Needs One Voice."

Advancing technology has made wastewater a sought-after commodity essentially adding to the water supply. In the realm of Orange County wastewater, there are two main wastewater service providers: the Orange County Sanitation District (OCSAN) and SOCWA. Both handle regional wastewater collection and treatment within their respective areas. Despite providing similar services, they operate under different governance structures. OCSAN is a special district, while SOCWA operates as a JPA. OCSAN serves 25 agencies covering north and central Orange County, totaling 2.5 million residents, while SOCWA currently represents 7 water and sewer agencies in South Orange County, serving approximately 600,000 residents. 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# REASON FOR THE STUDY

The public is generally unaware of the intricate processes and unseen operators who control the flow of their household water and sewage. However, the public has recently become keenly aware of rising utility bills. Media coverage has highlighted various water agencies raising rates to address escalating water costs, aging infrastructure, lack of upgrades, and deferred maintenance. The condition of water and wastewater infrastructure must be regularly assessed for an effective capital improvement program to maintain optimum performance.<sup>5</sup> A recent example is the proactive April 16, 2024 "Huntington Beach Water/Wastewater Rate Report" proposal needed to ensure reliable water and wastewater systems through 2040.<sup>6</sup> Over the past few years, several water agencies across Orange County have faced backlash from ratepayers for massive hikes to cover such expenses.

In 2023, public attention was drawn to the aftermath of the SMWD's 2021 annexation of the SJC water systems. Media reports cited SMWD officials claiming neglect under prior SJC management. News coverage also focused on proposed rate increases so excessive that they generated protests from some of the most severely impacted customers. This being the most recent water systems consolidation, OCGJ was curious about the overall process, pre-existing condition of city's water systems, and reasons underlying these major rate differences.

Additionally, with an interest in regional water matters, the OCGJ decided to extend its scope and examine the broader network of water and wastewater entities in South Orange County. The OCGJ identified a group of major water/wastewater providers that, through a long-standing JPA, manage and provide regional collection and treatment of wastewater to support their respective service areas. The OCGJ then undertook an investigation to assess the governance structure and operational effectiveness of this collaborative legal network. The OCGJ was particularly interested in the interrelationship of these water and wastewater providers and the prospect of future consolidations in South Orange County.

## METHOD OF STUDY

The OCGJ conducted interviews with key personnel, attended tours, observed meetings, and reviewed documents relevant to the topic. Research focused primarily on public agencies serving South Orange County.

# INVESTIGATION AND ANALYSIS

# **WATER SYSTEMS – THE CONSOLIDATION PROCESS**

#### Case Study: City of San Juan Capistrano and Santa Margarita Water District

The City of San Juan Capistrano's (SJC) water utilities transfer offers an insightful case study highlighting the challenges and benefits with consolidating its municipal water systems with the Santa Margarita Water District (SMWD). Records dating back to 2000 reveal a decades-long struggle marked by local political tensions, financial strain from ratepayer lawsuits, deferred maintenance, and insufficient capital reinvestment in the water system. These factors, compounded by a reluctance to adjust rates to cover ongoing water costs, culminated in a critical junction where the city eventually found itself seeking a more capable water provider to assume control of its water systems.

In the pivotal year of 2011, the financial hardships plaguing SJC intensified. A series of multimillion dollar lawsuits led to a substantial decrease in the city's bond rating, creating an additional \$7.5 million deficit in the city's budget. Faced with this fiscal crisis, the city resorted to extreme budgetary measures with city-wide cutbacks affecting the utility sector.

This financial rollercoaster persisted through Fiscal Years 2012 to 2014, until 2015 delivered yet another major economic hit. There was an unfavorable Court of Appeal's decision in a lawsuit concerning the City's billing rate system that impacted affluent and high-water users. It mandated an additional \$4.1 million refund, exacerbating the City's already precarious financial state. It was at this point, in 2015, that the City began to explore divesting its water and wastewater utilities. By August 2016, the City took a decisive step by filing an application with Orange County LAFCO to conduct a focused Municipal Service Review (MSR). The purpose was to explore the potential transfer of its water and wastewater operations and facilities to a public successor agency.

# LAFCO's Regulatory Role: Municipal Service Reviews

LAFCOs are independent regulatory commissions throughout California that were created by the legislature in 1959 and are charged with controlling and adjusting the boundaries of cities and most special districts in all 58 counties. (See Cal. Gov. Code §§ 56001, 56325.) Besides regulating local government boundaries, LAFCOs play an important role in evaluating municipal services within their counties and making recommendations for improvements. LAFCOs review and update the designated sphere of influence for each city and special district under their jurisdiction. Prior to establishing or updating a sphere of influence, LAFCO must perform a special MSR. MSRs are comprehensive studies to determine the adequacy of governmental services being provided by the local agencies under LAFCO jurisdiction. MSRs can be conducted

individually for specific cities or districts, covering all services, or on a county-wide or regional basis focused on specific services.

As the local regulatory agency, Orange County's LAFCO was tasked with reviewing the annexation proposal submitted by SJC and analyzing the financial suitability and operational capability of potential public successor agencies. On October 10, 2018, LAFCO issued its Focused MSR,<sup>8</sup> which assessed the SJC's utilities and identified potential successor public agencies to assume their operations.<sup>9</sup> This report held significant weight in the City's search for a solution to off-loading its distressed assets.

The MSR identified three interested special water districts for further consideration: South Coast Water District (SCWD), Santa Margarita Water District (SMWD), and Moulton Niguel Water District (MNWD). Notably, the report underscored that all three potential agencies were generally better positioned than the city to provide water and sewer services to the community, 10 thus marking a turning point in SJC's search for a viable solution to its long-standing water system challenges.

Following presentations from three qualified special districts and input from the public, SJC selected SMWD on February 19, 2019, for further discussion on the transfer of the City's water and sewer utility systems. The City Council's rationale for this decision was based on the potential for an economy of scale, enhanced operations, infrastructure improvements, and stabilized utility rates for its ratepayers. Subsequently, on January 21, 2020, the City unanimously approved the annexation agreement with SMWD and in late winter of 2020, SMWD filed an annexation application with LAFCO. As part of the process, SMWD submitted a Plan of Service proposing enhanced efficiency and cost-effective delivery of services to the affected ratepayers.

On August 19, 2021, LAFCO approved the SMWD annexation of SJC's water and wastewater utilities, citing such benefits as stabilization of rates and immediate, long-term improvements of both utilities.<sup>15</sup> SMWD assumed operational control of the City's water systems on November 15, 2021<sup>16</sup>, designating the area formerly serviced by the

SJC as Improvement District 9 (ID 9), distinct from SMWD's Improvement Districts 1 through 8.<sup>17</sup>

In May 2023, SMWD issued a Cost of Service and Rate Study concerning ID 9 that focused on determining rates necessary to cover water service costs as required by the California Constitution under Proposition 218.<sup>18</sup> The study found 135 prominent ratepayers, including shopping centers, industrial buildings, schools, churches, and a major non-profit, that would be significantly impacted by the proposed monthly rate increases, <sup>19</sup> specifically for their fire service lines. For instance, businesses faced increases from nearly \$9,700 to over \$14,000 annually for fire service lines, a result of SMWD's new rate methodology based on capacity. In contrast, residential lines saw more modest increases of no more than \$30 a month.<sup>20</sup>

SMWD responded to the rate increase concerns by sending out required notices to new ID 9 ratepayers and met with those severely impacted. The proposed rate increases were publicized by local media, leading to protests from some affected ratepayers. At a July 12, 2023, public hearing on proposed rates, SMWD staff highlighted the City's deferred maintenance of infrastructure, and the lack of rate increases since July 2018. They argued that the increases were necessary to align ID 9 with the rest of the district. Protesting ratepayers claimed the proposed rate hikes were unjust. One ratepayer hired a consultant to evaluate the SMWD rate study. Thirteen water districts in Orange and Riverside Counties were included in the investigation. The rate methodology employed in the SMWD Cost of Service and Rate Study was not used in any of the 13 districts that were studied.<sup>21</sup>

In response to this feedback, SMWD's Board of Directors voted to continue the meeting to August 2, 2023. On that date, the Board approved ID 9 water rate increases proposed by staff, except for the capital charge component for fire meter owners. Additionally, the Board ordered a new Cost of Service and Rate Study for all districts within SMWD to be completed by June 30, 2024.

#### **SJC/SMWD Consolidation Timeline**



#### **Summation**

Although initial rate increases drew some criticism from the community, after the consolidation, the average monthly residential rate went up \$30. Overall, the SMWD consolidation signaled a positive direction for SJC's water future. Since the transfer, new SMWD customers have generally expressed satisfaction with their new provider's service and water quality, as reflected in polls and customer surveys.<sup>22</sup> Additionally, SMWD is actively addressing deferred maintenance needs and making necessary infrastructure capital improvements neglected over time. Also, customer rates for ID 9 are on schedule to be consistent with the entire district by 2030.<sup>23</sup>

The case of the SJC's water systems having undetected deficiencies underscores the need for an extensive assessment of the utilities in advance of such reorganizations. Transparency and more due diligence would have mitigated some consolidation concerns and helped smooth the transition of service providers. Research also suggests the need for a more extensive analysis of rate increases for non-residential customers.

#### WASTEWATER SYSTEMS - REGIONAL COLLABORATION

#### Case Study: South Orange County Wastewater Authority (SOCWA)

SOCWA was formed in 2001 when the South East Regional Reclamation Authority, Aliso Water Management Agency, and South Orange County Reclamation Authority consolidated to meet the wastewater needs of more than 500,000 homes.




Figure 4 Source: sdcwa.org waternewsnetwork.com

The mission of SOCWA is to collect, treat, beneficially reuse, and dispose of wastewater in a manner that protects and respects the environment; maintains the public's health; and meets local, state, and federal regulations.<sup>24</sup> (See figure 4)

SOCWA exists to handle the wastewater needs of homes and businesses throughout South Orange County. It oversees the entire process from collection to disposal, ensuring water is treated properly. Additionally, SOCWA plays an important role in producing recycled water for irrigation and commercial purposes, saving a substantial amount of domestic water annually. This translates to preserving around 1.6 billion gallons of water, equivalent to 16,259 acre-feet.

SOCWA operates in collaboration with member agencies, including local water providers and local cities. It manages various programs to fulfill the Clean Water Act and National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES)<sup>25</sup> permit requirements. It also operates two ocean outfalls and three wastewater treatment plants. The facilities

owned and/or operated by SOCWA include the Coastal Treatment Plant located in the City of Laguna Beach, the JB Latham Treatment Plant located in the City of Dana Point, and the Regional Treatment Plant located in the City of Laguna Niguel. Together these three plants provide regional collection and treatment to approximately one third of the County's population.

# **Wastewater Purification and Recycling**

#### **Joint Power Authority: Governing Structure**

SOCWA is a JPA originally founded by 10 member agencies consisting of local water and service districts and cities. A JPA is a membership between two or more public agencies to jointly exercise common powers.<sup>26</sup> SOCWA currently has 7 member agencies which include two cities, four water districts, and a community services district. The four water districts in SOCWA provide sewer and water service to their customers. (See Appendices 1 and 2).

SOCWA's Board of Directors is made up of one representative from each of SOCWA's members. Each director has one vote regardless of their individual levels of contribution to SOCWA's revenues or the size of the population or territory they serve. Among other functions, the Board is responsible for approving SOCWA's budget, appointing its general manager, and taking other administrative actions. While SOCWA's Board governs matters that affect SOCWA as a whole, members enter into agreements with each other to establish project committees to serve their specific needs.<sup>27</sup>

A project committee forms when members enter into agreements to share the cost of an existing SOCWA wastewater processing facility or to construct a new facility in exchange for their use of the facility for processing their wastewater products or for other purposes. By entering into these agreements, members establish a right to a certain amount of capacity in a SOCWA facility. Capacity here refers to the member's right to use the facility to process wastewater liquids and solids or to perform advanced water treatment. Project committee agreements and budgets express these capacities as a percentage of the total capacity of the facility for its different functions.<sup>28</sup>

Voting at the project committee level also follows a one-member, one-vote structure. Members of a project committee vote on matters directly related to that project committee, including budgets to maintain or expand the facility. Members of project committees are bound by the terms of their agreements to pay their share of project costs. Members may only be relieved of this obligation by mutual consent of all participating members of the particular project committee.<sup>29</sup>

SOCWA has no direct taxing authority, and nearly all funding for its operations comes directly from the contribution of members. SOCWA bills project committee members for their share of SOCWA's costs to construct, operate, and maintain the facilities the project committees utilize. Project committee agreements establish each participating

member's share of operation and maintenance costs and capital costs generally based on the member's level of usage or capacity rights.<sup>30</sup>

#### **SOCWA: Disputes and Succession**

In May 2017, SOCWA, along with three of its members, filed a lawsuit alleging that one of its members – Moulton Niguel Water District (MNWD) had failed to pay its contractual share of project costs for the Coastal Treatment Plant (CTP).<sup>31</sup> MNWD entered into a project committee with the City of Laguna Beach, SCWD, and Emerald Bay Service District (EBSD) in 1999 to use CTP's capacity to process up to 1.96 million gallons per day (MGD) of its wastewater products. In response, MNWD stated it no longer used any of its contractual capacity to CTP and filed an answer and cross-complaint in August 2017 alleging fiscal mismanagement, fiscal improprieties, and poor retention of financial records on the part of SOCWA.<sup>32</sup>

In March 2018, the California State Auditor released its audit report (SOCWA State Audit Report)<sup>33</sup> concerning the financial management practices and governance structure of SOCWA. It found that the elements of SOCWA's governance structure were generally similar to that of other wastewater and water JPAs in California. The report found evidence of financial mismanagement and inadequate record keeping but indicated that SOCWA had taken steps to correct its fiscal and record keeping practices. In response to the audit SOCWA agreed to the recommendations contained in the report.<sup>34</sup>

In February 2019, the Riverside Superior Court issued its tentative ruling holding that MNWD was legally obligated to pay its proportional share of all costs, including capital costs and items necessary to maintain and operate the Coastal Treatment Plant until February 19, 2030 when the CTP project agreement ended.<sup>35</sup> In May 2019, SOCWA, MNWD, SCWD, EBSD, and the City of Laguna Beach issued a public statement regarding the litigation on the coastal treatment plant, and that the parties had agreed to resolve their differences on mutually agreeable terms.<sup>36</sup>

On August 9, 2023, LAFCO issued its MSR Sphere of Influence Reviews covering the Southwest Region (OCLAFCO SW MSR).<sup>37</sup> It identified all agencies in the region that receive wastewater services in some capacity from SOCWA. Services provided by SOCWA generally fit into two areas:

- 1. Permitting and regulatory support for the operation of all wastewater treatment plants in south Orange County
- 2. Operation of three wastewater treatment plants

The MSR also noted the SOCWA's JPA agreement previously included ten agencies but had recently been reduced to seven voting members including the El Toro Water District (ETWD), MNWD, SCWD, EBSD, the City of Laguna Beach, SMWD, and the City of San Clemente. As of July 1, 2023, the following three agencies were no longer members of SOCWA: Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD), Trabuco Canyon Water District (TCWD), and SJC. San Juan Capistrano's wastewater services and infrastructure were assumed by SMWD through an annexation to the district in 2021 and TCWD and IRWD had arranged for former SOCWA services to be provided through other means.<sup>38</sup>

The MSR stated SOCWA staff were aware of the evolving issues regarding SOCWA's management, purpose, and structure, and had hired a facilitator at the request of SCWD to assist in moving the discussion forward. Additionally, SOCWA staff noted that the agencies have full authority to make any changes they desire to the JPA agreement, provided they get the appropriate majority.

The MSR further noted within SOCWA there are numerous shared facilities for wastewater collection and treatment. These are managed by SOCWA through separate project agreements or committees among various member agencies. Many of these agreements predate SOCWA and are due to expire in 2030. MNWD had expressed strong interest in assuming the operational responsibility of one of SOCWA's regional facilities, the Regional Treatment Plant. In its justification, MNWD saw a potential benefit if several of SOCWA's assets were operated by each member agency. In their view, which was shared by SMWD, SOCWA is not structured to meet the wastewater service needs of some member agencies and should focus on providing enhanced permitting and regulatory compliance support for the SOCWA member agencies.

The MSR found that SCWD had expressed a strong interest in preserving the existing structure of SOCWA while also expressing openness to evaluating the agreements for efficiency and improvement. The other agencies reviewed in the MSR did not express similar interest in a reexamination of the SOCWA arrangements, nor did they share any complaints or concerns about SOCWA's service level. While they did not express a desire to advance these ideas during the MSR process, they stressed their openness to reevaluating the project agreements as they approach their respective expiration dates. After the MSR, SOCWA members conducted facilitator directed meetings to address member concerns.

considerations to facilitate MNWD's withdrawal from SOCWA.<sup>39</sup> The proposed agreement will become effective on June 30, 2024, and is contingent on several conditions including the required unanimous vote of all SOCWA members to authorize MNWD's withdrawal from SOCWA.<sup>40</sup>

On May 1, 2024, a special meeting was held to address the March 7, 2024, proposal to transition the Regional Treatment Plant to MNWD and to facilitate MNWD's withdrawal from SOCWA. There was unanimous approval of the proposal in principle with members set to return to their respective boards for official approval by June 1, 2024.

The steps ahead are to continue negotiations and require MNWD to provide its official response. If consensus is reached, then terms and conditions would be laid out to adopt the necessary amendments to various JPA agreements and Project Committee agreements. MNWD would need to develop and adopt an agreement with SCWD, EBSD, City of Laguna Beach, and ETWD for handling solid waste. Treatment, conveyance, and outfall agreements would need to be developed and adopted between SOCWA and MNWD.

Lastly, upon MNWD's withdrawal from SOCWA, and after the buyout payment, the transfer of the Regional Treatment Plant and its operation to MNWD would be complete.

#### **Summation**

The history of SOCWA shows the divergent approaches of its member agencies. While some agencies embraced long-range regional collaboration, it could be argued that smaller districts with overweighted voting authority hindered them. Past litigation among JPA members has created a legacy of distrust, and Balkanized decision-making among its governing directors. Water officials interviewed by the OCGJ clearly indicated tension among rival SOCWA members. It appears some members are entrenched in transactional approaches aimed solely at addressing ownership, operation, and modernization of treatment plants within their own boundaries.

Water and wastewater agencies, like SOCWA, have worked together through legal agreements in the past. However, SOCWA's collaborative efforts have not always been successful which may be reflective of its JPA governing structure.<sup>41</sup> Over time, changes in local support, leadership, and financial pressures have led member agencies to reconsider their involvement in the JPA.

It was evident from the SOCWA special meeting of May 1, 2024, that leaving a JPA can be complicated. SOCWA started with 10 members but is now down to 7, and negotiations are ongoing for yet another member to leave. Now, SOCWA needs new agreements to govern its operations going forward. This leaves uncertainty about SOCWA's future beyond the expiration of its original contracts in 2030. However, with California's ocean discharge regulations being so extensive, JPA members have expressed support for SOCWA to continue in some form to handle permitting as well as other regulatory support functions within its purview.

#### THE PATH FORWARD

### Water System - Consolidations

Consolidating, restructuring, or merging agencies is a function of assessing the costs and benefits regarding safety, security, <sup>43</sup> reliability, financial and operational efficiencies, and economies of scale, versus the attraction of local control. A thorough assessment of this "balancing act" will benefit future generations of Orange County residents.

South Orange County is served by ten water providers in jurisdictions ranging in size from 540 customers in EBSD to 116,000 customers in IRWD (Appendices 1 and 2). To advance consolidations, over the past decade the State of California has developed financial incentives for larger water systems to absorb small systems, introduced new authorities to mandate consolidation under specific circumstances, and invested significantly in technical assistance resulting in over 200 completed projects throughout the State with more underway.<sup>44</sup> Interviews identified the benefit of having a single entity to discuss the optimal management/structure of water, wastewater, and reuse operations with a common vision for the future of Southern Orange County.

In recent years, water districts have experienced the benefits of consolidation with one another, as evidenced by IRWD. It has successfully acquired five other agencies over the past twenty-seven years, including the Santa Ana Heights Mutual Water Company in 1997, Carpenter Irrigation District in 2000, Los Alisos Water District in 2001, Santiago County Water District in 2006, and the Orange Park Acres Mutual Water Company in 2008.<sup>45</sup>

Irvine Ranch Water District's process involves a selective approach, emphasizing efficiencies and mutual benefits. It begins with a consolidation request to IRWD from the prospective water agency, followed by mutual agreement on terms, and then an application to LAFCO for their evaluation. Irvine Ranch Water District has a proven track

record since 1997 of having successfully unified five providers benefitting 57,000 residents with improved water reliability and standardized rates. With extensive cash reserves, IRWD is poised to maintain and enhance its water systems over the next fifty years.

It is evident that past consolidations among water agencies have yielded positive outcomes by enhancing efficiencies and fostering mutual benefits through shared expertise and resources. With the multitude of water districts and the risk of financial strain comparable to SJC, future consolidations are not just probable but beneficial. Hence, it is imperative to draw lessons from past experiences. By reviewing the issues and concerns encountered by SMWD and by adopting the strategies employed by IRWD, there is an opportunity to improve the process for future consolidations (Appendices 1 and 2).

#### **Wastewater Systems - Collaboration**

In South Orange County, collaboration among water and wastewater providers can drive positive changes for the region's future. Despite past challenges posed by differing governing boards and environmental perspectives across separate jurisdictions, officials have shown the willingness to unify and address shared concerns. The future of SOCWA involves reorganizing the structure so that it can resolve the operational issues of treatment plants. This allows major water agencies to focus on maximizing wastewater reuse and to minimize ocean discharge, with the aspirational goal of zero discharge. Collaboration among all agencies operating treatment plants is paramount, to adopt a more integrated management approach.

The Moulton Niguel Water District, one of the leading service providers, has embraced a transformative drive to water management. Since 2019, MNWD has pursued federal funds to strengthen its infrastructure against seismic and severe storm damage. In 2024 the district was awarded \$10.3 million in federal grants to strengthen and improve its wastewater infrastructure. The grant is administered by the California Office of Emergency Services and funded by the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) to replace sewer lines that move more than half of all district wastewater. Advocating for funding as a region to address aging infrastructure is vital to ensure the long-term sustainability of water management efforts. By working collectively towards these goals, South Orange County can lead the way in sustainable water management practices for the benefit of current and future generations.

The Mouton Niguel Water District is also working on a reverse osmosis project called OASIS (Optimal, Adaptive, Sustainable, Integrated, Supply) to receive wastewater from homes and businesses, and treat it for potable reuse. The OASIS project emerges as a beacon of innovation and sustainability, offering not only reliable water reuse but also an opportunity for education and public engagement. By demonstrating the safety and effectiveness of direct potable reuse, South Orange County can pave the way for similar

projects across California. Building partnerships with neighboring regions, environmental organizations, and governmental bodies will be crucial to securing state, federal, and private funding dedicated to advancing water reuse in South Orange County, with OASIS as the flagship project, being a top priority.

Another transformative advancement is the Doheny Ocean Desalination Project, planned by the South Coast Water District as part of the Joint Regional Water Supply System. This project would create a new, local, drought-proof water supply that would provide emergency water supplies.<sup>47</sup> Benefits would provide a water source at a reasonable cost, up to 5 million gallons per day of drinking water and the potential for long-term regional benefits. The proposed facility would be located near Doheny State Beach in the City of Dana Point and is planned to be on-line in 2028.

Looking ahead, the integration of treatment plant operations and the advancement of technologies like direct potable use and desalination are key focal points. As such, the OCGJ recommends LAFCO form a task force comprising representatives of affected water districts to study the transformation of SOCWA and prepare a report identifying the optimal future of water and wastewater systems in South Orange County.

In an era of emerging opportunities, a comprehensive regional plan developed in conjunction with all stakeholders is needed for guiding future projects and addressing evolving needs. As the task force facilitator, LAFCO can also play a pivotal role in studying future consolidations and a unified regional approach to water and wastewater management and service delivery. By planning and working together, South Orange County is poised to lead the way in securing a better future for generations to come.

## COMMENDATIONS

**Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD)** - The Irvine Ranch Water District successfully acquired 5 water providers serving 57,000 residents since 1999. These consolidations provide reliable water supply at equitable rates, which are mutually beneficial to all customers.

**City of San Clemente** – Based on interviews and a comprehensive site visit, the OCGJ found the City of San Clemente does an excellent job in maintaining and operating its water and wastewater utility systems. This integrated system augments the City's local recycled water sources and is beneficial in reusing urban runoff and reducing biosolids.

# **FINDINGS**

In accordance with California Penal Code Sections 933 and 933.05, the 2023-2024 Grand Jury requires responses from each agency affected by the findings presented in this section. The responses are to be submitted to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court.

Based on its investigation described here, the 2023-2024 OCGJ has arrived at the following principal findings:

- F1. San Juan Capistrano's deferred maintenance of the water/wastewater utility resulted in the need to transition the facility to a larger water provider to allow more efficient management and maintenance of the infrastructure.
- F2. The SMWD proposed rate increase severely impacted San Juan Capistrano's non-residential customers and led to protests of unfairness and negative attention from the local media.
- F3. SOCWA's member agencies have widely diverse populations, requirements, and revenues. This has led to conflicts over governance, facility operation, and control, affecting the evolving potential for wastewater reuse.
- F4. There is currently no unified strategy for the future of water/wastewater provision in South Orange County

# RECOMMENDATIONS

In accordance with California Penal Code Sections 933 and 933.05, the 2023–2024 Grand Jury requires responses from each agency affected by the recommendations presented in this section. The responses are to be submitted to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court.

Based on its investigation titled "Emerging Opportunities in South County Water/ Wastewater Systems," the 2023-2024 OCGJ makes the following two recommendations:

- R1. The OCGJ recommends that by January 1, 2025, LAFCO studies a policy of conducting a post-consolidation agency review to be held within 24 months of agency reorganizations to determine their overall impact on the public. (F1, F2)
- R2. The OCGJ recommends that by January 1, 2025, LAFCO form a task force comprising representatives of affected water agencies to study the transformation of SOCWA and prepare a report on the future of water/wastewater in South Orange County. (F3, F4)

## RESPONSES

California Penal Code Section 933 requires the governing body of any public agency which the Grand Jury has reviewed, and about which it has issued a final report, to comment to the Presiding Judge of the Superior Court on the findings and recommendations pertaining to matters under the control of the governing body. Such comment shall be made no later than 90 days after the Grand Jury publishes its report (filed with the Clerk of the Court). Additionally, in the case of a report containing findings and recommendations pertaining to a department or agency headed by an elected county official shall comment on the findings and recommendations pertaining to the matters under that elected official's control within 60 days to the Presiding Judge with an information copy sent to the Board of Supervisors.

Furthermore, California Penal Code Section 933.05 specifies the manner in which such comment(s) are to be made as follows:

- (a) As to each Grand Jury finding, the responding person or entity shall indicate one of the following:
  - (1) The respondent agrees with the finding.
  - (2) The respondent disagrees wholly or partially with the finding, in which case the response shall specify the portion of the finding that is disputed and shall include an explanation of the reasons therefore.
- (b) As to each Grand Jury recommendation, the responding person or entity shall report one of the following actions:
  - (1) The recommendation has been implemented, with a summary regarding the implemented action.
  - (2) The recommendation has not yet been implemented, but will be implemented in the future, with a timeframe for implementation.
  - (3) The recommendation requires further analysis, with an explanation and the scope and parameters of an analysis or study, and a timeframe for the matter to be prepared for discussion by the officer or head of the agency or department being investigated or reviewed, including the governing body of the public agency when applicable. This timeframe shall not exceed six months from the date of publication of the Grand Jury report.
  - (4) The recommendation will not be implemented because it is not warranted or is not reasonable, with an explanation, thereof.

(c) If a finding or recommendation of the Grand Jury addresses budgetary or personnel matters of a county agency or department headed by an elected officer, both the agency or department head and the Board of Supervisors shall respond if requested by the Grand Jury, but the response of the Board of Supervisors shall address only those budgetary or personnel matters over which it has some decision-making authority. The response of the elected agency or department head shall address all aspects of the findings or recommendations affecting his or her agency or department.

**JPA** - Joint Powers Authority is a membership between two or more public agencies to jointly exercise common powers.

**LAFCO** - Local Agency Formation Commission is a countywide commission, required in each California county. LAFCO's powers include approving, establishing, expanding, reorganizing, and, in limited circumstances, dissolving cities and special districts.

**MSR** - Municipal Service Review is a comprehensive analysis conducted by LAFCO to assess the performance of municipal services within a specific geographic area.

NPDES - National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System

**OASIS** - A initiative for advanced integrated water management started by MNWD. (Optimal, Adaptive, Sustainable, Integrated, Supply)

**OCSAN** - Orange County Sanitation District provides wastewater collection, treatment, and recycling North and Central Orange County.

Potable Water - Water that is suitable for human consumption.

**Recycled Water** - Wasterwater that has been treated (filtered and disinfected). It is used as irrigation for golf courses and parks.

**Special District** - A local government entity that was created to provide a specific public service. Examples are water service, cemetaries and fire protection.

**SOCWA** - South Orange County Wastewater Authority is a Joint Powers Authority with seven member agencies, consisting of local retail water agencies and cities that provide



<u>Emerald Bay Service District</u> (EBSD) - Provides fresh water supply under contract with the Laguna Beach County Water District. Collects wastewater and transmits to Laguna Beach.

<u>Irvine Ranch Water District</u> (IRWD) - Serves Central Orange County, including the following cities: Irvine, Newport Beach, Tustin, Orange, Lake Forest, and Costa Mesa.

<u>Laguna Beach County Water District</u> (LBCWD) - Provides water service to portions of the city of Laguna Beach, a portion of Crystal Cove State Park, and the unincorporated community of Emerald Bay.

<u>City of Laguna Beach</u> - Provides wastewater collection and/or transmission services to the city of Laguna Beach, a portion of Crystal Cove State Park, and the unincorporated community of Emerald Bay.

<u>Moulton Niguel Water District</u> (MNWD) - Provides water and wastewater services to customers in Laguna Niguel, Aliso Viejo, Mission Viejo, Laguna Hills, and Dana Point.

<u>Municipal Water District of Orange County</u> (MWDOC) is a wholesale water provider. It purchases imported water through the <u>Metropolitan Water District of Southern California</u> (MET) and delivers this water to its 27 member agencies, who in turn, provide retail water services to the public. It is the only agency with members from all water providers in South Orange County.

Orange County Water District (OCWD) - Manages the ground water supply for Orange County. It is a wholesale agency.

<u>City of San Clemente</u> - Provides water/wastewater services to the residents of San Clemente

Dear Presiding Judge Hernandez:

On June 21, 2024, the Orange County Grand Jury released a report titled "*Emerging Opportunities in South County Water/Wastewater Systems*." This report requested that Irvine Ranch Water District (IRWD) respond to findings and recommendations in the report. Per the 2022-2024 Orange County Grand Jury's request, and in accordance with Penal Code 933.05, below are IRWD's responses to Finding F4 and Recommendation R2.

## Background Information:

IRWD provides high-quality drinking water, reliable wastewater collection and treatment, groundbreaking water recycling programs, and environmentally sound urban runoff treatment to approximately 445,000 residents and a daytime population of 600,000, served through more than 131,000 connections.

IRWD remains a longstanding leader in the areas of water resource management and planning, with an emphasis on sustainability. The District is also a recognized leader in the areas of water recycling, drought preparedness, emergency supply development, supply diversification, water use efficiency, and financial management.

As noted in the Grand Jury's report, IRWD has extensive experience with water and wastewater agency consolidations. Over the years, IRWD has consolidated with five water suppliers. The Grand Jury's report accurately related that IRWD's integrated services have allowed for reduced overhead and administrative costs, lower rates and charges to customers of the consolidated district, with benefits to all customers.

IRWD agrees that good governance includes analyzing alternative arrangements that may improve how public agencies provide services. When considering consolidation requests, IRWD seeks to identify increased efficiencies through economies of scale and mutual benefits from combined expertise and resources. Community engagement and support is also important for any successful consolidation.

It is important to note that successful consolidations take time and allow for evaluation, analysis, planning, and community engagement. This is one of the many reasons why IRWD does not support unilaterally initiated consolidations, detachments, or other forced service boundary changes.

Given this background, IRWD's responses to the Grand Jury's report are provided below.

## **IRWD** Responses:

**Finding F4:** "There is currently no unified strategy for the future of water/wastewater provision in South Orange County."

Response: IRWD disagrees partially with this finding.

South Orange County currently has eight retail water districts and one city that provide water and that are responsible for wastewater services, although they may provide those services to the community via the South Orange County Wastewater Authority (SOCWA).

South Orange County's retail water agencies strive to collaborate effectively on water/wastewater management, infrastructure development, and policy – despite having differing views on wastewater governance and how best to service their customers.

IRWD disagrees partially with the finding based on what a "unified strategy" could mean. We agree that there may not be a unified strategy for the future of water/wastewater provision if one views a "unified strategy" as being future provision of those services by one entity or agreement on if SOCWA should play a role.

We disagree with the finding if a "unified strategy" means a common understanding of who is responsible for providing water and wastewater services to each portion of South Orange County and a plan on how they will provide those services. This unified strategy for the provision of services existing. The strategy is that each retail water agency will be responsible for ensuring those services are provided to their service area, and those service areas are clearly defined and understood. A retail water agency may provide the services itself, or via contract with SOCWA or another entity, but will decide what is best for its customers. This is the approach IRWD has taken.

**Recommendation R2:** "The OCGJ recommends that by January 1, 2025, LAFCO form a taskforce comprising representatives of affected water agencies to study the transformation of SOCWA and prepare a report on the future of water/wastewater in South Orange County. (F3, F4)"

Response: The recommendation will not be implemented by IRWD because this recommendation calls for action by another entity, LAFCO, to form a taskforce.

IRWD regularly works with other water and wastewater agencies in South Orange County, and we discuss the region's future water and wastewater needs.

IRWD has planned for its future sewer collection and treatment needs and will continue to do so. If LAFCO or a group of South Orange County agencies want to engage in further discussions about the future of South Orange County water and wastewater service and needs, IRWD would engage in those conversations, as appropriate, given our service boundaries, IRWD customer needs, and our interest in regional collaboration and cooperation. IRWD would not engage in a conversation about future structure or management of the South Orange County Wastewater Authority, as we are no longer a member of that joint powers authority.

# SAN JOAQUIN RESERVOIR ASPHALT CONCRETE LINER INTERIM REPAIRS CONSTRUCTION AWARD

# **SUMMARY:**

The San Joaquin Reservoir Asphalt Concrete Liner Interim Repairs project includes repairing the asphalt concrete liner at various locations around the entire perimeter of the reservoir. Staff recommends that the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a construction contract with PaveWest Inc. in the amount of \$279,856 for the San Joaquin Reservoir Asphalt Concrete Liner Interim Repairs project.

# **BACKGROUND:**

The San Joaquin Reservoir stores approximately 3,000 acre-feet of recycled water and is connected to the Zone B distribution system. The reservoir is located near Bonita Canyon Road and 73 Toll Road, as shown in Exhibit "A". San Joaquin Dam, which forms San Joaquin Reservoir, was constructed in 1962 to store treated water for the Metropolitan Water District of Southern California (MWD). In 2004, shortly after purchasing San Joaquin Reservoir from MWD, IRWD repaired the asphalt concrete liner before converting the reservoir from storing untreated water to storing recycled water. IRWD has regularly completed minor liner repairs since acquiring ownership of the reservoir. The liner extends from the top of the reservoir down to the toe of the slope located at the bottom of the reservoir and continues around the entire nearly one-mile-long reservoir perimeter.

The reservoir asphalt concrete liner, which protects the underlying earth material from eroding, has deteriorated and now requires repairs to extend the life of the liner until a future time when the reservoir can be taken offline, and IRWD can complete a comprehensive liner repair project. This interim repair project includes repairing approximately 42,000 linear feet of cracks in the liner and approximately 4,000 square feet of pavement restoration. Staff advertised the project for construction and received bids in advance of when the water level is expected to be at its lowest, which is generally in September. All the repair work will occur with the reservoir online and a lowered water level.

In the future, when additional seasonal recycled water storage is made available, staff intends on proceeding with the comprehensive liner repair project to maximize the life of the liner and reduce the amount of ongoing maintenance.

## Construction Award:

In August 2023, IRWD contracted with Labelle-Marvin, Inc. to provide a visual liner inspection and recommendations for the interim repairs of the reservoir slope liner. Labelle-Marvin completed the asphalt concrete liner inspection and prepared design plans for the interim repair

work. Staff advertised the project for construction bids to a select list of 13 paving contractors. The bid opening was held on June 11, 2024. PaveWest is the apparent low bidder with a bid amount of \$279,856. PaveWest's bid information is provided as Exhibit "B", and a summary of the two bids received as shown below:

Staff reviewed PaveWest's bid and has determined that it is responsive. Staff recommends that the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a construction contract with PaveWest in the amount of \$279,856.

# Material Sole-Source:

Certain materials are routinely sole-sourced on IRWD projects to match other products in use on a particular public improvement or to obtain a necessary item that is only available from one source. While most sole-sourced items are individually under \$35,000 and only require a single bid per the District's procurement policy, there are occasionally items that are of higher value. This project does not have sole-sourced items.

## FISCAL IMPACTS:

The San Joaquin Reservoir Asphalt Concrete Liner Interim Repairs project is utilizing the General System Replacements and Modifications, Project 11851, which is included in the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024-25 Capital Budget and is funded through 100% recycled water replacement funds. The existing budget is sufficient to fund the recommendation presented herein.

# ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE:

This project is exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) as authorized under the California Code of Regulations, Title 14, Chapter 3, Section 15301, which provides an exemption for minor alterations of existing public or private structures, facilities, mechanical equipment, or topographical features, involving negligible or no expansion of use beyond that existing at the time of the lead agency's determination. A Notice of Exemption for the project will be filed with the Orange County Clerk Recorder.

## **COMMITTEE STATUS:**

Construction awards are not routinely taken to Committee prior to submittal to the Board.

# WOODBRIDGE RECYCLED WATER PIPELINE REPLACEMENT CONTRACT CHANGE ORDER, BUDGET INCREASE, AND FINAL ACCEPTANCE

## **SUMMARY:**

The Woodbridge Recycled Water Pipeline Replacement project is complete. The contractor, E.J. Meyer Company, completed the required work and the project has received final inspection. Staff recommends that the Board:

- Authorize a budget increase in the amount of \$200,000, from \$15,218,000 to \$15,418,000;
- Approve Contract Change Order No. 13 in the amount of \$15,908.79; and
- Accept construction of the Woodbridge Recycled Water Pipeline Replacement project.

# BACKGROUND:

This project replaced approximately nine miles of asbestos cement pipe (ACP) of the recycled water system in Woodbridge. The recycled water system serving the area was originally constructed between 1975 and 1981 and experienced many failures in recent years. West Yost Associates completed the design in March 2022, and E.J. Meyer Company was awarded the construction contract on April 26, 2022. E.J. Meyer Company mobilized in June 2022 after receipt of approximately 10,000 linear feet of polyvinyl chloride (PVC) piping and ductile iron fittings that IRWD pre-purchased to allow the contractor to construct all the mainline piping near school areas during the summer months. The design and construction of the project was coordinated with the City of Irvine and the Woodbridge community's multiple schools, parks, and homeowner associations. To reduce impacts to schools, Irvine Unified School District restricted the construction of new pipelines adjacent to schools to occur during its summer recess. All nine miles of the new PVC pipeline were installed and put into service by February 2024 and E.J. Meyer Company completed the final pavement restoration on May 31, 2024. A summary of change orders is provided as Exhibit "A".

# Contract Change Order No.13:

Contract Change Order No. 13 (CCO13) accounts for an increase in the quantity of Bid Item 35 for grind and overlay paving and a decrease in the quantity and increase in the unit price of Bid Item 36 for slurry seal.

The original bid quantity of Bid Item 35 was based on the grind and overlay of the mainline trench and did not include any quantity for the new lateral trenches or additional areas that were requested by the City of Irvine during construction. The additional quantity of grind and overlay was 1,244.53 tons of asphalt at a bid item unit cost of \$225 per ton, for a total of \$280,019.25.

The original bid quantity of slurry seal under Bid Item 36 was 2,150,000 square feet, but the actual square footage of slurry seal installed by the project was 1,191,194 square feet. This was a total reduction of 958,806 square feet or 45% of the original bid quantity. The decrease in quantity of slurry seal was due to overestimation by the design consultant and the City of Irvine's road rehabilitation project that slurry sealed the entire length of Alton Parkway, thereby eliminating the area from the District's scope of work. E.J. Meyer Company requested a \$0.06 increase in the unit price for slurry seal from \$0.35 to \$0.41 per square foot due to the reduction in the overall bid quantity. Adjustment of a unit price is allowed per the general provisions where a change in the bid quantity exceeds 20% of the awarded bid quantity. The reduction in the quantity of Bid Item 36 resulted in a credit amount of \$335,582.10, and the \$0.06 increase in the Bid Item 36 unit price resulted in a cost of \$71,471.64, leading to a net credit of \$264,110.46 for Bid Item 36.

The total cost for CCO13 is in the amount of \$15,908.79 and the absolute value of CCO13 is \$687,072.99. No additional contract days were required for these adjustments, and the project was substantially completed on May 31, 2024. The District's current procurement policy requires Board approval for change orders with an absolute value greater than \$200,000. CCO13 is provided as Exhibit "B".

## FISCAL IMPACTS:

The Woodbridge Recycled Water Pipeline Replacement, Project 11571, is included in the FY 2023-24 Capital Budget. A budget increase is required to fund the final construction as shown in the table below.

# TECHNICAL INFORMATION MANAGEMENT SYSTEM THREE-YEAR SOFTWARE CONTRACT RENEWAL

## **SUMMARY:**

The District has utilized the LabWorks Laboratory Information Management System (LIMS) to record and retrieve laboratory data since its implementation in 1997, and the software can no longer effectively support the District's Environmental Laboratory Accreditation Program (ELAP) requirements. A new Technical Information Management System (TIMS) that will replace the LIMS and meet the District's ongoing and future information management needs, ensure regulatory compliance and water quality reporting requirements are met, manage field monitoring through a mobile application, and interface a streamlined instrument-technical information transfer is currently being implemented. Staff recommends that the Board authorize the General Manager to execute a three-year contract with Accelerated Technology Laboratories, Inc. (ATL) in the total amount of \$482,616 for Fiscal Years (FY) 2024-27.

# **BACKGROUND:**

The District has utilized the LabWorks LIMS to record and retrieve laboratory data since its implementation in 1997. Throughout the years, LabWorks has undergone ownership and company changes that have impacted the quality of the software and services provided by the company. In recent years, since Perkin Elmer sold the company, the quality of the software and the services provided has significantly degraded. LabWorks has not been able to provide the support needed to meet the new requirements of the District's ELAP, mobile application needs, regulatory compliance and water quality regulatory reporting requirements, and data management needs. LabWorks has failed to keep up with the industry standards for the environmental, drinking, and wastewater industry.

Staff performed a thorough evaluation of multiple Technical Information Management System software packages available in the industry to ensure the needs of the District were all met. ATL's software package was shortlisted based on the evaluation because it encompasses the complete package for managing the collection of samples in the field to the analytical testing and reporting capabilities in the laboratory, and finally, the accessibility of data component that other software packages lacked. As an additional due diligence effort, staff evaluated ATL's success in implementing their software package at other water and sanitation districts, such as the Inland Empire Utilities Agency, Silicon Valley Clean Water, and Arkansas Department of Environmental Quality. Each agency provided positive feedback on the implementation process and how they have been able to improve overall efficiency within their organizations.

Staff is now implementing the TIMS from ATL, which includes Titan LIMS, Titan iMobile, and Results Point software. The new software will meet ongoing and future needs to maintain the District's ELAP, ensure regulatory compliance and water quality reporting requirements are met,

manage our field monitoring through a mobile application, and interface a streamlined instrument-technical information transfer. After successful implementation of the TIMS for the Water Quality and Regulatory Compliance Department, the software could potentially be utilized to manage and access technical information in other areas of the District.

Since the TIMS project kicked-off in February 2024, the District has made significant progress integrating the workflows of the Water Quality & Regulatory Compliance Department into the new software. Static data tables that include information of the laboratory parameters have been successfully uploaded to TIMS. Laboratory test method workflows have been successfully developed in TIMS and continue to progress. Staff continue to meet and train with ATL staff for continued development of TIMS. The go-live launch and full implementation of TIMS for the Water Quality and Regulatory Compliance Department is expected in early 2025.

# **FISCAL IMPACTS:**

The initial implementation of the Software as a Service (SaaS) for the new TIMS was funded through the FY 2023-24 Operating Budget. The initial implementation cost for TIMS for FY 2023-24 was \$182,892, which included professional services and training for implementation and the initial SaaS startup fees for February-June 2024 during the initial implementation phase.

The ongoing annual SaaS fee for the next three years will amount to \$160,872 per fiscal year (FY 2024-25, FY 2025-26, and FY 2026-27). The total TIMS SaaS fees for three fiscal years is \$482,616. The Fiscal Year Operating Budget for each year will fund the SaaS fee. The three-year software contract renewal is attached as Exhibit "A".

The current LabWorks LIMS annual cost is \$120,442, and this will be canceled in 2025 when the new TIMS software is fully implemented and all data from the LabWorks LIMS has been migrated to the new software.

All right, title, and interest, including all intellectual property rights, in and to the Software Services, Software, the Documentation, and the Content and any modifications thereto made by or for Client (including any copies or subsequent Releases) shall be, and will remain the exclusive property of ATL or any third party from whom ATL has licensed software or technology, as applicable. Client further acknowledges that the Software, Software Services, Documentation, Content, and the information therein is proprietary to ATL and its licensors and comprises: (a) original works of authorship, including compiled information containing ATL's or its licensors' selection, arrangement and coordination, and expression of such information; (b) confidential and trade secret information; and (c) information that has been created, developed, and maintained by ATL or its licensors at great expense of time and money such that misappropriation or unauthorized use by others for commercial gain would unfairly and irreparably harm ATL and/or its licensors, as applicable. This Section shall apply to all Content whether or not it originated from ATL's Content library. All Client data is owned by Client.
- **1.6. Responsibilities of Client.** In the event this Agreement or any Work Order requires Client to provide any resources in connection with the implementation of the Software Services, and Client fails to provide the requisite quality or quantity of such resources, or fails to provide

such resources in a timely manner for a period that does not exceed 15 days, ATL's sole remedy is an extension of the applicable delivery dates corresponding to the delay. If Client's failure to provide such resources exceeds 15 days, and Client's failure has resulted in an unavoidable increase in the cost of the applicable Software Services, then ATL will be entitled to recover from Client the reasonable amount of such increased costs. ATL's right to delay applicable delivery dates or recover for increased costs may be exercised only if ATL provides Client with reasonable notice of Client's failure and ATL uses commercially reasonable efforts to perform notwithstanding Client's failure to perform.

### SERVICES; HARDWARE; THIRD PARTY SOFTWARE; THIRD PARTY DATABASES

Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement and the execution of an applicable Quote or statement of work, Client may purchase from ATL certain Customizations, Services, hardware, third party software, and third-party databases.

- 2.1. Customizations: are quoted/estimated based on the information provided by customer at the time of request, or as described in an RFQ/RFI/RFP. If the quote estimate is accepted a requirements document (RD) is created with detailed input from the customer that will more accurately define the customization and provide an actual cost/level of effort to complete the customization. Upon completion of the RD, and customer agreement with the description/function of the customization and its cost (this could be higher or lower than the estimate), the customer will sign for approval to move forward. A modification to the original PO may be needed, or a separate purchase order issued, and a 50% deposit for customizations over \$5,000.00 are required prior to ATL establishing a schedule and starting the work.
- **2.2.** Customization Acceptance / Testing: From the date that ATL delivers a customization the client has 14 days to test functionality and inform ATL if customization does not meet the agreed functionality in the signed requirements document. Should customer not notify ATL, the customization is considered accepted by the customer.
- 2.3. Customization Change Requests: Changes or modifications to a signed RD are handled via a Change Order Request. A Change Order request will specify the changes or modifications being requested with an estimate of the cost/level of effort to complete. If accepted, an RD is created with an actual cost/level of effort to complete the request. A change order shall not delay acceptance or the unnecessary withholding of payment of the original RD. Should a customization be completed and at the time of delivery customer decides to not deploy and instead chooses to make additional changes customer will make payment on original customization quote before additional change requests will be addressed.
- **2.4. Delivery Dates:** ATL does not guarantee delivery dates with respect to customizations. Any date or timeline provided is a prediction only and not a contractually obligated delivery date.

### 3. FEES AND EXPENSES

- **3.1.** Fees. Client shall pay to ATL a Fee for the following services or items licensed or purchased pursuant to an executed Quote or statement of work:
  - Software Services
  - Customizations
  - Deployment Services
  - Transaction Services
  - Third party databases
  - Hardware and third-party software
  - Other Services
- **3.2. Hosting Fees:** Client shall be responsible for monthly hosting and setup fees, as noted on the invoice, from the agreed-upon start of the

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deployment process (First Access). These fees are due irrespective of deployment timeline and or use of environment by client.

- **3.3.** Expenses; Shipping Costs. Should Client request ATL to travel to Client's site, Client agrees to reimburse ATL for <u>all pre-approved travel and travel related expenses incurred by ATL</u>. Client will pay all costs relating to the shipment of any hardware and materials.
- **3.4.** Fee Increases. ATL shall be permitted to increase the Fees and third-party license costs no more than once per year, by no more than the Consumer Price Index for All Urban Consumers for the prior twelve (12) month period. This does not include any year one discounts offered unless otherwise specified in this Agreement or on the quote.
- Payment Terms. All Fees, expenses, and costs shall be paid in United States dollars. Payment terms shall be set forth in the applicable Quote or statement of work. Client shall agree to the following payment options,; (1) Bank Draft; (2) payment annually, by filling out Schedule G - ATL Recurring Payment Authorization Form. All recurring monthly hosting costs will be paid in advance by automatic electronic charge of a Client bank account as selected in Schedule G. ATL will initiate electronic charge of such invoiced amounts on or around the 25th of each month and receipt is sent to Client. Client will deliver to ATL an executed authorization for such charge in the form attached to this Agreement in Schedule G - ATL Recurring Payment Authorization Form or such other form acceptable to ATL, and such form may be blank or detached from this Agreement without impairing the legal effect of this Agreement. ATL may refuse to proceed with providing any Services in the absence of such delivery. Client hereby warrants on an ongoing basis that the automatic charge facility will be maintained during the term of the Agreement, that ATL is authorized to make charges as provided in this Agreement, and that the account to be charged is not the account into which any collections that represent payment by any government source or program, in whole or in part, are initially

Should payment authorization fail prior to the end of the payment term all user accounts shall automatically be disabled and customer will not be able to continue using services until payment is made.

- **3.6. Other fees & Services**: For all non-recurring monthly charges ATL will mail an invoice for Fees for Services at the time the work is completed or other agreed upon milestones. All invoiced amounts (excluding recurring amounts but including and not limited to Fees for Services and travel expenses) will be due Net 30 from date of invoice.
- 3.7. Failure to meet Payment Terms. If Fees, expenses, and costs are not paid within thirty (30) calendar days from the date of the applicable invoice, such amounts are considered past due. In such a circumstance, ATL may, without limiting ATL's other rights and remedies: (i) disable all user accounts, access to all virtual machines, access to client data and access to Support Services, which shall remain in effect until payment is made in full. In the event monthly Fees, expenses, and costs are not paid within ninety (90) calendar days from the date of the applicable invoice, Client's virtual environment may be disabled, saved to disk and stored for no more than six (6) months from the date of the applicable invoice. Data will not be provided to Client until such time as payment is made in full for all Fees, expenses and costs outstanding to bring Client's account current.
- **3.8. Taxes.** All Fees are exclusive of any and all taxes, duties, or levies assessed by applicable governmental authorities. All such taxes, duties, and levies (exclusive of any taxes based upon ATL's income) shall be assumed by and paid for by Client.

### 4. TERM AND TERMINATION

4.1. Term. The term of this Agreement shall commence upon the Effective Date and continue in full force and effect for a period of 36 months unless earlier terminated in accordance with this Section 4 or

- as otherwise specified in this Agreement. Upon expiration of the initial term, this Agreement shall automatically renew for three successive 12-month periods unless a party provides the other party with written notice of such party's desire to terminate at least ninety (90) days prior to the expiration of the then-current term. "Term" shall mean the initial 36-month term plus any successive 12-month term extensions.
- **4.2. Bankruptcy.** Either party may terminate this Agreement and any rights granted hereunder by providing written notice to the other party upon the occurrence of any of the following events: (i) a receiver is appointed for the other party or its property; (ii) the other party makes a general assignment of all or substantially all of its assets or business for the benefit of its creditors; (iii) the other party commences or has commenced against it, proceedings under any bankruptcy law, which proceedings are not dismissed within sixty (60) days; or (iv) the other party ceases to do business.
- **4.3. Termination by ATL.** ATL shall have the right to terminate this Agreement and any rights granted hereunder in the event Client (i) commits a material breach of any of its obligations concerning scope of use or the protection of the Software Services, Software and/or Documentation, intellectual property of ATL, or Confidential Information; or (ii) materially breaches any of its obligations under any provision of this Agreement, which breach is not remedied by Client within forty five (45) days after receipt of written notice from ATL.
- **4.4. Termination by Client.** Client shall have the right to terminate this Agreement in the event that ATL materially breaches any of its obligations under this Agreement, which breach is not remedied within sixty (60) days after receipt of written notice from Client. Client shall also have the right to terminate this Agreement upon at least 60 days prior written notice to ATL in the event that Client's funds for its next fiscal year are not appropriated for this Agreement. In addition, Client may terminate this Agreement as set forth in section 4.1 above.

### 4.5. Rights Upon Termination.

- **4.5.1.** All rights granted hereunder shall terminate upon termination of this Agreement. Termination of this Agreement or any Software license shall not limit either party from pursuing other remedies available (except where a sole remedy is specified), including, but not limited to, injunctive relief, nor shall such termination relieve Client's obligation to pay all Fees, expenses, and costs that have accrued or are otherwise owed by Client to ATL pursuant to this Agreement. The parties' rights and obligations under sections 1.3, 1.5, 4, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11, 12, 13, and 14 shall survive termination or expiration of this Agreement.
- **4.5.2. Vendor Expenses.** Client acknowledges that in order to provide the Services, ATL has entered into hosting arrangements with third party service providers. In consideration of the foregoing, upon the termination of this Agreement for any reason other than ATL breach, Client agrees to reimburse ATL for all reasonable costs and expenses suffered or incurred by ATL relating to the termination of any such hosting arrangement, including, without limitation, severance or termination payments. ATL and Client agree that the payments as set forth in this Section 4.5.2 are not intended as a penalty, but are instead intended as reasonable estimates of the losses and expenses resulting to ATL from termination of the Agreement.
- TRANSITION SERVICES Except for in the case of a breach of Client obligations set forth in Section 1 of the Agreement or failure to pay all required Fees hereunder, in the event the Agreement is terminated, in order to effectuate Client's orderly transition to a subsequent vendor, ATL will, at Client's request, continue to provide Services for up to ninety (90) days after the date of termination. During such time, Client will continue to pay all related Fees and will still be subject to all terms and

conditions of the Agreement. At Client's reasonable request, ATL will use commercially reasonable efforts to provide such additional assistance to effectuate such transition at ATL's then-current time and materials rates.

6. ACCEPTANCE – HARDWARE In the event that Client has purchased hardware through ATL, Client shall evaluate any hardware delivered by ATL and shall submit a written acceptance or rejection to ATL during the Acceptance Period. Failure by Client to deliver a written acceptance or rejection within the Acceptance Period shall be deemed an acceptance by Client of such hardware "As-Is, Where-Is."

### 7. WARRANTIES

- **7.1. Software**. ATL warrants that the Software Services shall perform substantially in accordance with its Software Documentation, provided by ATL, during the Warranty Period. The foregoing warranty shall be null and void to the extent any failure to perform in accordance with the Documentation is caused by: (i) any modification of the Software Services by Client or any third party; (ii) used by Client in combination with hardware or software not authorized by ATL in writing; or (iii) Client's use of the Software Services in violation of the Documentation or this Agreement.
- **7.2. Services.** ATL warrants that the Software Services and any other Services provided hereunder shall be provided in a professional and workmanlike manner.
- **7.3.** Hardware. In the event that Client has purchased hardware through ATL, ATL shall pass through to Client any original manufacturers' warranties for hardware products acquired by ATL for Client. ATL does not make any warranties in connection with the hardware and hereby expressly disclaims any warranties with respect thereto.
- "No Viruses". ATL warrants and covenants that no portion of the 7.4. Software Services, when made accessible to Client, contains a "virus" or other computer software routine intended or designed to or which has the capacity to: (i) permit access or use of the Software Services or the Client's systems by any person not authorized by Client; (ii) disable, damage, erase, disrupt or impair the normal operation of the Software Services; (iii) disable, damage, erase, disrupt or impair the normal operation of any hardware or other software or data on Client's computer systems; or (iv) have any other material and adverse effect or impact on the Client's computer systems ("Viruses"). In addition, ATL will take commercially reasonable and diligent measures (consistent with the following sentence) to ensure that no Viruses or similar items are coded or introduced by ATL into the Software Services, Client's computer systems interfacing with the Software Services, or the information systems and operating environments and processes used by ATL or its providers to provide the Software Services. ATL will continue to review, analyze and implement improvements to and upgrades of its Virus prevention and correction programs and processes that are commercially reasonable and consistent with the then current information technology industry's standards.

### 8. DISCLAIMERS

- **8.1.** Third Party Databases' Data. ATL shall not be liable for any specific settings or databases embedded within the Software Services. ATL does not warrant the accuracy of codes or other data contained in the Software Services or any third-party database incorporated into the Software Services. ATL shall not be liable for the content, accuracy, clarity, or resolution of any scanned images or digital images.
- **8.2. General**. Neither ATL, its agents, officers, directors, employees, nor its licensors warrant that the software will be uninterrupted or error-free or that any software, content, or services will meet client's requirements. Except as set forth above, ATL, its agents, officers, directors, employees, and its licensors specifically disclaim all warranties with respect to the software, the documentation, the content, and/or

any materials or services furnished to client under this agreement, whether express, implied, statutory, or otherwise, including all implied warranties of merchantability, fitness for a particular purpose, title, and non-infringement.

**8.3.** Content. Content provided at deployment, via ATL's content library, or otherwise is provided on an "as is" and "as available" basis. Client expressly agrees that use of the content is at client's sole risk. The content may contain content uploaded by users, and such content has not been reviewed by ATL. Client understands and agrees that client is solely responsible for verifying the accuracy of the content. ATL and its affiliates assume no responsibility for and make no warranty or representation as to the accuracy, currency, completeness, reliability, or usefulness of any content.

### 9. REMEDIES FOR BREACH OF SOFTWARE AND SERVICES WARRANTIES

In the event of breach of any of the Software or Services warranties in Section 7.1 or 7.2, Client's sole and exclusive remedy, and ATL's sole liability shall be for ATL to use commercially reasonable efforts to (a) correct any error in the software as to which client has given ATL written notice; (b) replace any defective software as to which client has given ATL written notice; and/or (c) re-perform any service provided by ATL which client reasonably deems deficient and as to which client has given ATL written notice. In the event ATL, in its sole discretion, determines that it would not be commercially reasonable to correct, replace, or re-perform any defective software or deficient service, client shall be entitled to a refund of fees paid to ATL for any such software or service. The rights and remedies of Client provided herein will not be exclusive and are in addition to any other rights and remedies provided by law or under the Agreement.

### 10. LIMITATION OF LIABILITY

10.1. General. In no event shall the aggregate liability of ATL, its agents, officers, directors, employees or any of its licensors arising out of or in connection with this agreement exceed three times (3x) the amount paid by Client to ATL during the twelve (12) months immediately preceding the claim giving rise to the liability under this agreement. Except as provided for in section 7.4, in no event shall, ATL, its agents, officers, directors, employees or its licensors be liable for any damages caused by any viruses, trojan horses or other similar code, or any denialof-service attacks or any unauthorized access to client's system by unrelated third parties. Except with respect to ATL's fraudulent action or willful misconduct, in no event shall ATL, its agents, officers, directors, employees or its licensors be liable for: (i) any lost profits or revenues, costs of procurement of substitute goods or services, or for any other special, consequential, incidental, punitive, or indirect damages arising out of this agreement, whether under theory of contract, tort, strict liability, or otherwise, and whether or not ATL has been advised of the possibility of such damages or (ii) loss of data resulting from a major system failure under this agreement, provided ATL restores all client data to the point of the evening before the failure. These limitations shall apply notwithstanding any failure of essential purpose of any limited remedy.

### 11. INDEMNIFICATION

11.1. Indemnity by ATL. ATL shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Client from and against any and all third party claims, damages, liabilities, penalties, judgments, and costs (including without limitation reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of any claim for: (i) infringement of any patent, trademark, trade secret, copyright, or other intellectual property right of a third party related to the Software Services, provided that such claim does not arise solely out of Client's use of the Software Services in breach of this Agreement; or (ii) ATL's fraudulent action or willful misconduct. Client shall (a) notify ATL promptly in writing of any such claim of which Client becomes aware; (b) give ATL sole authority to control fully the defense and settlement of

any such claim, provided however, Client may retain their own independent counsel at Client's own expense; and (c) furnish all reasonable assistance and provide all appropriate documentation in its possession requested by ATL. Client's failure to comply with (a) through (c) above will only relieve ATL of its related indemnification obligations if such failure materially prejudices ATL's defense of any claim.

- **11.2.** Exclusions. Notwithstanding the foregoing, ATL shall have no obligation to indemnify Client pursuant to this Section 11 with respect to any infringement or alleged infringement to the extent resulting from (i) any modification to the Software Services made by Client or any third party; (ii) any unauthorized use of the Software Services by Client or any third party; (iii) failure of Client to use Releases provided by ATL; (iv) any use of the Software Services in combination with other software, hardware, or data not supplied or authorized in writing by ATL; or (v) ATL's compliance with Client's designs, processes, or formulas.
- **11.3. ATL Options.** In the event of an infringement claim against Client with respect to the Software Services, or in the event ATL believes such a claim is likely, ATL shall have the option, at its expense, to (i) modify or replace the Software Services so that they are non-infringing; or (ii) obtain for Client a right to continue accessing the Software Services. If neither of the foregoing alternatives is commercially practicable, ATL shall have the right to require the Client to terminate the Software Services, and ATL shall refund to Client all Fees paid for such Software Services, and the rights granted to such Software Services shall terminate with no continuing obligation or liability of ATL to Client.
- **11.4. Sole Remedy.** The foregoing states the sole and exclusive liability of ATL, its agents, officers, directors, and employees for any third-party claim of infringement and is in lieu of any and all warranties, expressed or implied, in regard thereto.
- 11.5. Indemnity by Client. Client shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless ATL from and against any and all damages, liabilities, costs, and expenses (including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees) arising out of (i) Client's failure to comply with all applicable laws, rules, and regulations, (ii) Client's breach of any of the provisions of this Agreement, or (iii) Client's negligence or willful misconduct. ATL shall provide Client with (a) prompt written notice of any such claim of which ATL becomes aware; (b) all reasonable assistance and documentation in ATL's possession requested by Client to defend such claim; and (c) control over the defense and settlement of such claim, provided that Client shall not agree to any settlement or other disposition that imposes any obligation on ATL.

### 12. CONFIDENTIAL INFORMATION

12.1 Confidential Information. Client acknowledges that the Software Services, other Services, Software, the Documentation, and the Content contain ATL's and/or its licensor's proprietary information and Confidential Information. Each party shall treat as confidential all Confidential Information of the other party, will not use such Confidential Information except as expressly set forth herein or as otherwise authorized in writing, will implement reasonable procedures to prohibit the disclosure, unauthorized duplication, misuse, or removal of the other party's Confidential Information, and will not disclose such Confidential Information to any third party except as may be necessary and required in connection with the rights and obligations of such party under this Agreement, and subject to confidentiality obligations at least as protective as those set forth herein. Without limiting the foregoing, each of the parties will use at least the same procedures and degree of care which it uses to prevent the disclosure of its own confidential information of like importance to prevent the disclosure of Confidential Information disclosed to it by the other party under this Agreement, but in no event less than reasonable care.

- 12.2 Public Records Act Acknowledgement. ATL acknowledges that Client is a public agency subject to the Public Records Act ("PRA"). ATL consents to the public disclosure of this Agreement, including exhibits and attachments, its proposal, and any other information provided to Client unless that material is conspicuously marked as confidential, and ATL waives all claims against Client, its directors, officers, employees, and agents, for the disclosure of such information. If Client receives a request to disclose information that was provided to Client by ATL in the course of performing this Agreement and that was designated by ATL as "confidential information," Client will notify ATL of that request. If ATL objects to the disclosure, ATL shall expeditiously, at its sole expense, seek a court order to prevent the disclosure, and absent the granting of such an order, Client will release the information as required by applicable law.
- **12.3 PRA Act Indemnity.** ATL shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless Client, its directors, officers, employees, and agents, from any and against all damages (including but not limited to attorneys' fees), and pay any and all costs and expenses, including attorneys' fees, related to the withholding of the records designated as confidential by ATL. If ATL fails to accept a tender of a defense, Client reserves the right to resolve all claims at its sole discretion, without limiting any rights stated in the Agreement.
- 13. AUDIT During the term of this Agreement, no more than once per year, and for a term of one (1) year after termination of this Agreement, upon reasonable notice, ATL may perform at its sole cost and expense reasonable audit and inspection procedures to confirm Client's compliance with the terms and conditions of this Agreement, including, but not limited to, provisions relating to scope of use of the Software Services and protection of Confidential Information. Client shall reasonably cooperate in any such audit, which may be conducted in person or remotely. The audit shall be performed in a manner so as to minimize the impact on the Client's business.

### 14. GENERAL PROVISIONS

- **14.1. Applicable Law**. This Agreement and all matters arising out of or relating to this Agreement shall be governed by the substantive laws of the State of **California**, without regard to conflict of laws principles.
- **14.2.** Exclusive Jurisdiction and Venue. Any action of any kind by any party against another party arising pursuant to this Agreement may only be brought exclusively in courts of competent jurisdiction of **Orange County, State of California**, and the parties hereby submit to the exclusive jurisdiction and venue of such courts for such purposes.
- **14.3. Assignment.** Client may not sell, pledge, assign, sublicense, or otherwise transfer or share its rights or delegate its obligations under this Agreement without the prior written consent of ATL, which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld. Any attempted sale, pledge, assignment, sublicense, or other transfer in violation hereof shall be void and of no force or effect. Any authorized assignment by Client hereunder will be invalid unless the assignee agrees in writing to be bound by and to perform all obligations and terms of this Agreement. ATL may assign its rights and delegate its duties hereunder at any time without the consent of Client.
- **14.4. Modification; Amendment.** This Agreement may not be modified or amended except by a writing, which is signed by authorized representatives of each of the parties hereto.
- **14.5.** No Waiver. The failure of either party to exercise any right or the waiver by either party of any breach, shall not prevent a subsequent exercise of such right or be deemed a waiver of any subsequent breach of the same or of any other term of the Agreement.
- **14.6. Notice.** Any notice required or permitted to be sent hereunder shall be in writing and shall be sent in a manner requiring a signed receipt. Notice is effective upon receipt.

- 14.7. Force Majeure. Neither party shall be deemed in default of this Agreement to the extent that performance of their obligations or attempts to cure any breach are delayed or prevented by reason of any act of God, fire, natural disaster, accident, act of government, shortages of materials or supplies, or any other cause beyond the control of such party provided that such party gives the other party written notice thereof promptly and, in any event, within fifteen (15) days of discovery thereof and uses its commercially reasonable efforts to cure the delay or prevention. The parties will not be deemed to be in breach of this Agreement in the event that they, despite their commercially reasonable efforts, are not able to cure any such default under this Agreement.
- **14.8.** Equitable Remedies. The parties recognize that money damages shall not be an adequate remedy for any breach or threatened breach of any obligation hereunder involving, without limitation, intellectual property, Confidential Information, or use of the Software Services beyond the scope of the license granted by this Agreement. The parties therefore agree that in addition to any other remedies available hereunder, at law or otherwise, they shall be entitled to an injunction against any such continued breach of such obligations.
- **14.9. Entire Agreement.** This Agreement, and all schedules, Quotes, and statements of work attached hereto and incorporated herein, constitute the sole and entire agreement of the parties with respect to the subject matter hereof and supersede any prior oral or written promises or agreements. There are no promises, covenants, or undertakings other than those expressly set forth in this Agreement, and all schedules, Quotes, and statements of work.
- **14.10. Severability.** If any provision of this Agreement is held to be invalid or unenforceable, the remaining provisions of this Agreement will remain in full force.
- **14.11. Third Party Beneficiary.** No third party shall be deemed an intended beneficiary of this Agreement.
- 14.12. Export Regulations. Client shall not export, re-export, or transfer the Software Services or Documentation, except as authorized in writing by ATL and in accordance with the U.S. export control regulations and other applicable laws. Client is advised that the Software Services and the Documentation are subject to the U.S. Export Administration Regulations. Client agrees not to export, re-export, import, or transfer the Software Services or the Documentation contrary to U.S. or other applicable laws, whether directly or indirectly, or assist or facilitate others in doing any of the foregoing. Client represents and warrants that (a) neither the United States Bureau of Export Administration nor any other federal agency has suspended, revoked, or denied its export privileges, (b) Client is not located in, a resident of, or a citizen of, Cuba, Iran, Iraq, Libya, North Korea, Sudan, Syria or any other country to which the United States has embargoed goods. Client agrees not to use or transfer the Software Services for end use relating to any nuclear, chemical or biological weapons, or missile technology unless authorized by the U.S. Government by regulation or specific license.
- **14.13.** Independent Contractor. Neither ATL nor any party contracting with ATL will be deemed to be an agent or employee of Client. ATL is and will be an independent contractor and the legal relationship of any person performing services for ATL will be one solely between that person and ATL.

### 15. DEFINITIONS

The following definitions shall apply to this Agreement, including all schedules, Quotes, and statements of work:

- "Acceptance-Hardware Period" shall mean the ten (10) day period after hardware has been delivered to Client by ATL.
- "Authorized Users" shall mean employees of Client. For each user login licensed by Client, as specified in the Quote, Client has the right to one

unique named user in the database.

"Content" shall mean all system master files, templates, and reports that constitute a part of the Software Services and Software, and the electronic documents, files, data, forms, and other materials contained in such master files and templates, including those from ATL's Content library, whether or not they are subsequently modified by Client, and any such Content created after the Effective Date by or for Client in accordance with the terms of this Agreement or any related agreement.

"Confidential Information" shall mean any information relating to, or disclosed in the course of, this Agreement, which is designated as 'confidential' or 'proprietary' or some similar designation or information which is or should be reasonably understood to be confidential or proprietary to the disclosing party. Confidential Information includes but is not limited to the Software, the Documentation, the Content, the terms and pricing under this Agreement, business strategies, specifications, technical data, and all Quotes. Confidential Information shall not include information (a) already known to either party at the time of receipt thereof from the other; (b) that was readily available to the general public at the time of receipt thereof from the other; (c) that subsequently becomes known to the general public through no fault or omission on the part of the party receiving such information; (d) that is subsequently disclosed by a third party which has a bona fide and legal right to make such disclosure; or (e) that is required to be disclosed by a court of competent jurisdiction or other governmental authority or pursuant to applicable law, including the California Public Records Act, provided that the receiving party shall give prompt notice to the disclosing party prior to any such disclosure and reasonably assist the disclosing party in seeking a protective order.

"Customization" shall mean a requested modification to the look, feel or function of the software by a Client, as specified in the Quote and Requirements Document signed by client.

"Deployment Services" shall mean the hardware staging, data migration, deployment, and training services set forth in Schedule B and the applicable Ouote.

**"Documentation"** shall mean the user manual(s) for use of the Software Services. Documentation is provided in electronic form, incorporated into the Software Services.

**"Error"** shall mean any reproducible failure or inability of the Software Services to perform any material function set forth in the Documentation.

"Fee(s)" shall mean Software Services fees and any and all fees for purchasing Services, hardware, third party software, and third-party databases, as specified in a Quote or statement of work.

"Hosting Services" shall mean the hosting services provided by ATL to Client as set forth in a Statement of Work or Quote which shall relate to the operation and maintenance of systems and web sites used to host the Software.

"Quote" shall mean the Quote provided by ATL to Client pursuant to which Client orders Software Services, other Services, hardware, third party software, or third-party databases under this Agreement.

"Platform": Is the systems upon which the software runs. If user is able to connect to the login page the platform is considered available.

"Release" shall mean any version, update, release, patch, or enhancement of the Software, Services.

**"Services"** shall mean any services set forth in a statement of work or Quote, provided by ATL to Client, including, but not limited to, the Software Services, Support Services, Deployment Services, and Transaction Services.

**"Software"** shall mean the computer software program or programs described in the Quote, which is being provided by ATL to Client under a software as a service structure pursuant to the terms and conditions of this Agreement. This includes the supporting software (Citrix) and the actual LIMS software. If the user is able to login to the system and can see the

software icon but not launch the software then software is considered down.

**"Software Services"** shall mean the software service to be provided by ATL to Client, as set forth in the applicable Quote.

"Software Service Fee(s)" shall mean that applicable Fee due ATL for the Software Services and Support Services. Payment of the Software Services Fee shall entitle Client to receive Support Services, as set forth in **Schedule** A attached hereto.

**"Support Incident"** shall mean a problem with the Services that cannot be broken down into subordinate problems. For a request with subordinate problems, each problem is considered a separate incident, and therefore must be submitted as a separate support request.

"Support Services" shall mean the support services for the Software Services set forth in Schedule A and the applicable Quote.

"Warranty Period" shall mean the ninety (90) day period following the assigned date of first access.

## Attachment A: Insurance Requirements

Before commencing with the Services and without limiting ATL's indemnification obligations provided within this Agreement, ATL shall always maintain the following policies of insurance with insurers possessing a policyholders' Rating of A- (or higher) and Financial Size Category of VII (or larger) in accordance with the latest edition of Best's Key Rating Guide.

- A. <u>Comprehensive General Liability Insurance</u>. ATL shall maintain a comprehensive general liability insurance policy with coverage on an "occurrence" basis, including products and completed operations, property damage, bodily injury, personal injury, and, with limits no less than \$1,000,000 per occurrence, \$2,000,000 aggregate.
- B. <u>Automobile Liability Insurance</u>. ATL shall maintain an automobile liability insurance policy covering bodily injury and property damage for all activities of ATL arising out of or in connection with the Project, including coverage for any owned, hired, and non-owned, rented, or leased vehicles, in an amount not less than \$1,000,000 combined single limit for each accident.
- C. <u>Workers' Compensation Insurance</u>. ATL shall maintain a workers' compensation insurance policy (Statutory Limits) as required by state law, and if required to do so also maintain Employer's Liability Insurance (with limits not less than \$1,000,000). ATL shall submit to Client, along with the certificate of insurance, a Waiver of Subrogation Endorsement in favor of Client, its directors, officers, employees, and agents.
- D. <u>Professional Liability (Errors & Omissions)</u>
  <u>Insurance.</u> ATL shall maintain a professional liability insurance policy that covers the Services in connection with this Agreement, in the minimum amount of \$1,000,000 per claim and in the aggregate. Any policy inception date, continuity date, or retroactive date must be on or before the Effective Date of this Agreement. ATL shall maintain continuous coverage through a period no less than three years after completion of the services required by this Agreement.
- E. <u>Additional Insured</u>. General liability, automobile liability and all other applicable policies including excess/umbrella liability policies, shall provide, or be endorsed to provide, that Client, its directors, officers, employees, and agents, are additional insureds under such policies.
- F. <u>Primary Non-Contributory</u>. For any claims related to this Agreement, the ATL's insurance, including umbrella/excess coverage, must be primary and non-contributory. Any insurance or self-insurance maintained by Client, its directors, officers, employees, and agents will be excess of the ATL's insurance and will not contribute to such insurance.
- G. <u>Waiver of Subrogation</u>. All insurance coverage maintained pursuant to this Agreement must be endorsed to waive subrogation against Client, its directors, officers, employees, and agents, or must specifically allow ATL to waive its right of recovery prior to a loss. This provision applies regardless of whether or not Client has received a waiver of subrogation endorsement from the insurer.
- H. <u>Notice of Cancellation</u>. ATL shall oblige its broker and insurers to provide Client with a 30-day notice of cancellation (except for nonpayment for which a ten-day notice is required) or nonrenewal of coverage for each required coverage. If ATL's insurers are unwilling to provide such notice, then ATL shall notify Client immediately if ATL fails to renew any of the required insurance coverages or insurer's cancellation or non-renewal.

- I. Requirements Not Limiting. Requirements of specific coverage features or limits contained in this Section are not intended as a limitation on coverage, limits, or other requirements, or a waiver of any coverage normally provided by any insurance. If ATL maintains broader coverage and/or higher limits than the minimums shown above, Client requires and is entitled to the broader coverage and/or the higher limits maintained by ATL.
- J. <u>Separation of Insureds</u>. A severability of interests provision must apply for all additional insureds ensuring that ATL's insurance applies separately to each insured against whom claim is made or suit is brought, except with respect to the insurer's limits of liability. The policies shall not contain any cross-liability exclusions.
- K. <u>Self-Insured Retentions</u>. Any deductibles or self-insured retentions must be declared in writing.
- L. <u>Timely Notice of Claims</u>. ATL shall give Client prompt and timely notice of claims made, or suits instituted that arise out of or result from ATL's performance under this Agreement, and that involve or may involve coverage under any of the required liability policies.

### SCHEDULE A - SUPPORT SERVICES AGREEMENT

ATL shall provide Support Services pursuant to the Agreement and according to the further terms and conditions set forth below to Client for Software Services listed in a Quote, so long as Client has paid the applicable Software Fee and is not in breach of any provision of the Agreement.

#### 1. SUPPORT SERVICES

- 1.1. Software Support. ATL shall perform the following Software Support Services on a per incident basis: (i) assist Client in diagnosing reported Errors; and (ii) provide technical services to Client to attempt to correct diagnosed Errors. Software Support Services include support of Content. A Support Incident may require multiple interactions and off-line research to resolve it. Please note that a Support Incident involving an ATL Software Service bug will not be applied against Client's contracted support incidents.
- **1.2.** Hardware Support. ATL does not provide support for hardware at Client's site.
- 1.3. Work Not Covered. The following items are outside the scope of Support Services and are subject to additional charges billable in accordance with ATL's then current time and materials support policy: All time associated with problems or service calls that arise from: (i) Client's negligence; or (ii) alterations made or damage caused by parties other than ATL or its authorized representatives. ATL shall not be responsible for Client's computer network or for any connectivity or other related issues that prevent Client from gaining access to the Software Services.

### 2. DUTIES OF CLIENT

2.1. Administrator. Client shall designate a Software Services administrator. The administrator must have a working knowledge of the administrative module of the Software Services and Client data files and shall generally be responsible for template set-up, template management, and recording and reporting Errors and other problems. The administrator must attend the entire online administrative overview training session.

### 3. HOURS OF COVERAGE

- **3.1. Principal Period of Support.** The principal period of support ("PPS") is a nine (9) hour period beginning at 8:00 a.m. ET and ending at 5:00 p.m. ET (Monday through Friday, excluding holidays) in the contiguous United States.
- **3.2. After Hours Support.** The after-hours support (AHS) is from 5:01pm 7:59am and covers the "Platform" only.
- 3.3. Hourly Support Service. Support Services that are performed outside of the PPS, at the request of the Client, or that are outside the scope of, or in addition to, the Support Services detailed herein, shall be deemed hourly service, and Client shall be billed in accordance with ATL's then current time and materials support policy. Upon Client's request, ATL shall provide a written estimate of the cost to perform the work prior to beginning work on any

task that is being billed in accordance with ATL's time and materials support policy.

#### 4. PROCEDURES

- 4.1. Help Desk. Requests for Support Services will be directed to ATL customer support by calling the help desk telephone line or by sending an email or submitting a web form request to the help desk, if such Internet contact methods are available. If, during the PPS, ATL customer support personnel are unavailable to answer Client's call or immediately respond to Client's submission of email or web form requests. ATL shall use commercially reasonable efforts to respond to Client within 20 minutes of Client contacting the help desk if deemed to be a High Severity incident. ATL will work with the Client to categorize the reported problems by severity and update the customer support problem-reporting database as appropriate. ATL will use commercially reasonable efforts to resolve requests for Support Services reported by Client during the PPS in accordance with the severity matrix below, which severity level shall be finally determined by ATL, in its sole discretion. The resolution times set forth in the chart below are target times only, and are not guaranteed.
- 4.2. Authorized Contacts. Client may designate up to a maximum of two (2) authorized contacts per Client account. Additional contact people shall result in an additional charge to the Client. Client shall provide to ATL a list of its authorized contact people by the Effective Date of the Agreement. Client must give ATL prior notice of any proposed changes to the list of authorized contact people. The two (2) initial authorized contact people and any replacement contact people will not be authorized to contact the help desk until they have received the proper training from ATL.

### 5. SOFTWARE RELEASES

Subject to Client's payment of the Software Services Fee and compliance with all terms of the Agreement, ATL will provide Client access to Releases that are issued by ATL during the Term. Releases will be updated in the Software Services hosting environment at ATL's discretion with prior notice to Client. Updates will not take place during business hours, unless required to mitigate a specific issue affecting Client's usage of Software.

## 6. CONTENT LIBRARY

During the Term, provided that Client has paid the Software Services Fee, Client shall have access to ATL's Content library.

### 7. THIRD PARTY DATABASES

During the Term, provided that Client has paid the Software Services Fee, Client may purchase certain third-party databases pursuant to an applicable Quote. Such third-party databases will be periodically updated during the Term provided that Client has paid the Software Services Fee and Fees for such third-party databases.

### SCHEDULE B - STATEMENT OF WORK - DEPLOYMENT SERVICES

ATL will perform Deployment Services for the Software Services pursuant to the Agreement and according to the terms and conditions below and the applicable Quote and Quote Detail, so long as Client has paid the applicable Fees.

### 1. DEPLOYMENT AND TRAINING HOURS

- 1.1. Setup and configuration of base Virtual environment is included in the one-time "setup fee". This does not include any customizations unless specified on the Quote.
- 1.2. Hours included on the Quote Detail are estimated based on the historical average of hours required to deploy and train practices of similar size, specialty and number of locations. ATL deployment and training hours are delivered on a time and materials basis.
- 1.3. ATL shall provide both remote and on-site customization and training services at an hourly rate that is further defined in the Quote Detail. The hourly rate quoted is based upon an eight (8) hour day during normal business hours. Any work scheduled outside of normal business hours must be approved and scheduled in advance. ATL requires a (3) three-day minimum order for on-site visits.
- 1.4. Client purchased the number of customization and training hours set forth in the applicable Quote Detail. If Client requires additional customization hours, such time shall be made available to Client at ATL's then-current rates. Any Client caused delays while ATL is on-site shall count against the number of customization and training hours purchased by Client. All time incurred by the ATL customization and training team is documented on weekly time sheets and invoiced monthly. Hours invoiced can include, but are not limited to, phone calls, email correspondence, project planning, reporting, but do NOT include travel time.
- 1.5. ATL quotes hourly rates that include and exclude reasonable and customary travel expenses per the applicable Quote. For quotes that include reasonable and customary travel expenses in the hourly rate, any additional travel costs associated with the delay or change in agreed upon training dates will be invoiced as incurred as additional costs.

### 2. HARDWARE STAGING AND DATA MIGRATION

ATL will perform staging and set up and data migration services for the Software Services according to the terms and conditions below and the applicable Quote and Quote Detail, so long as Client has paid the applicable Fees. Staging and setup, and data migration services are quoted on a fixed fee plus reasonable and customary travel expense basis that is further defined in the Quote Detail.

2.1. Data Migration. If data migration services are specified on the Quote, ATL agrees to perform migration of data Client's current system to the Software Services for the charge set forth in the Quote, so long as the quality of the legacy system data is intact and accessible to ATL. Client will provide resources and personnel to complete all programming or reports necessary for data extraction, in the necessary formats, for the purpose of such data migration.

### 3. DEPLOYMENT AND TRAINING

- 3.1. Project Plan Development and Client Assessment. ATL will perform a review of Client needs and develop a project plan specific to those needs.
- 3.2. Training. Training will be provided to Client in two stages. First, Client's system administrator shall attend administrative overview training, which will include an overview of the Software Services and training on system set-up procedures. Second, Client's end users will attend end-user training, which will include short sessions focusing on end-user's use of the Software Services.
- **3.3. Quality Assurance and Go-Live.** Quality assurance and go-live consists of final testing and launch of the Software Services.

### 4. CLIENT RESPONSIBILITIES

To accomplish the Deployment Services tasks within the time estimated by ATL, ATL requires the following information and/or assistance from Client:

- **4.1. Appropriate Resources.** Client will provide appropriate resources and personnel throughout the deployment process.
- 4.2. Project Manager. Client must designate a "project manager," who will be responsible for ensuring that all requested documentation is provided to ATL in a timely manner. Client's project manager will be the key point of contact for ATL. The project manager, or a designee thereof, must attend all status update meetings between Client and ATL.
- 4.3. Time Sheet Approval. Client must provide written approval for ATL time sheets on a weekly basis. It is Client's responsibility to track and verify that the time invoiced is accurate. If there are issues with time reported or the quality of the training provided, Client must notify the deployment and training manager and the ATL accounting department in writing within 5 days of such training. ATL does not provide credits for training time. If ATL and Client mutually agree that adequate training was not provided, ATL will provide additional training at no additional cost to the Client. It is in the best interests of both ATL and the Client that Client's staff is adequately trained.
- **4.4. Network.** Client is responsible for ensuring that a computer network is installed and tested prior to deployment.

# 5. INTERFACES

Any interfaces to be developed by ATL for Client shall have the scope of work and Fees for such interface development set forth in a separate statement of work or Quote.

### 6. TERM

The Deployment Services term shall commence upon the Effective Date and continue until final completion of the Deployment Services.

### SCHEDULE C - BUSINESS ASSOCIATE AGREEMENT

This Business Associate Agreement ("BAA") is made and entered into as of the date of the Agreement by and between ATL ("Business Associate") and the Client ("Covered Entity"). This BAA is only in effect if Covered Entity has obligations, which were disclosed and are represented on ATL Software and Services Agreement, under Title II of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, as amended (including by the Health Information Technology for Economic and Clinical Health, the "HITECH Act"), and the regulations issued and effective thereunder (collectively, "HIPAA") to ensure the integrity and confidentiality of Protected Health Information ("PHI") that the Business Associate may create for or receive from the Covered Entity. This BAA is drafted in accordance with Covered Entity's obligations under Title II of the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996, as amended (including by the HITECH Act and HIPAA) to ensure the integrity and confidentiality of PHI that the Business Associate may create for or receive from the Covered Entity.

### 1. **DEFINITIONS**

Capitalized terms used but not otherwise defined in this BAA shall have the same meaning as set forth in HIPAA. "Privacy Rule" shall mean the Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information at 45 C.F.R. Part 160 and Part 164, Subparts A and E, as amended from time to time. "Security Rule" shall mean the Security Standards for the Protection of Electronic Protected Health Information at 45 C.F.R. Part 160 and Part 164, Subparts A and C, as amended from time to time.

### 2. OBLIGATIONS AND ACTIVITIES OF BUSINESS ASSOCIATE

- **2.1.** Business Associate agrees not to use or further disclose PHI other than as permitted or required by this BAA or as Required By Law.
- **2.2.** Business Associate agrees to use appropriate safeguards to prevent use or disclosure of the PHI other than as provided for by this BAA and in accordance with applicable law.
- 2.3. Business Associate agrees to implement administrative, physical, and technical safeguards that reasonably and appropriately protect confidentiality, integrity, and availability of Electronic PHI that it creates, receives, maintains, or transmits on behalf of Covered Entity.
- 2.4. Business Associate agrees to ensure that any agent, including a subcontractor, to whom it provides PHI received from, created by or received by Business Associate on behalf of Covered Entity, agrees to the same restrictions and conditions that apply through this BAA to Business Associate with respect to such information.
- 2.5. To the extent that Business Associate maintains PHI in a Designated Record Set, as defined at 45 C.F.R. § 164.501, Business Associate agrees to provide Covered Entity, upon request, in a reasonable time and manner, PHI maintained or created by Business Associate, so Covered Entity can respond to a request by an Individual for access to inspect and obtain a copy of PHI in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.524.
- 2.6. To the extent that Business Associate maintains PHI in a Designated Record Set, as defined at 45 C.F.R. § 164.501, Business Associate agrees to provide Covered Entity, upon request, in a reasonable time and manner, PHI maintained or created by Business Associate, so Covered Entity can respond to a request by an Individual for amendment to the PHI and if requested by Covered Entity to incorporate any amendments to the PHI maintained by the Business Associate in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.526.
- 2.7. Business Associate agrees to make internal practices, books, and records, including policies and procedures and PHI, relating to the use and disclosure of PHI received from, or created or received by Business Associate available to HHS within a reasonable time or

- designated by HHS, for purposes of the Secretary determining Covered Entity's compliance with the Privacy Rule.
- 2.8. 45 C.F.R. 164.308, 164.310, 164.312, and 164.316 shall apply to Business Associate in the same manner that such sections apply to Covered Entity.
- 2.9. Business Associate agrees to document such disclosures of PHI and information related to such disclosures as would be required for Covered Entity to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.528.
- 2.10. Business Associate agrees to provide to Covered Entity or an Individual within a reasonable time, information collected in accordance with Section 2.9 of this BAA, to permit Covered Entity to respond to a request by an Individual for an accounting of disclosures of PHI in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.528. Effective as of the date specified by HHS, with respect to disclosures related to an Electronic Health Record, Business Associate shall provide the accounting directly to an individual, in an electronic format, if requested, making such a disclosure request, if a direct response is requested by the individual.
- 2.11. Effective February 17, 2010, Business Associate will comply with any restriction request under Section 4 if: (1) except as otherwise requested by law, the disclosure is to a health plan for purposes of carrying out payment or health care operations (and is not for purposes of carrying out treatment); and (2) the PHI pertains solely to a health care item or service for which the health care provider involved has been paid out of pocket in full.
- 2.12. Business Associate agrees to report to Covered Entity any use or disclosure of PHI or any Security Incident not provided for by this BAA of which it becomes aware. In addition, Business Associate shall notify Covered Entity within a reasonable amount of time of the discovery of a Breach of Unsecured PHI. Business Associate will treat the Breach as being discovered, and provide any required notification in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.410. If a delay is requested by a law-enforcement official in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.412, Business Associate may delay notifying Covered Entity for the applicable time period.

### 3. PERMITTED USES AND DISCLOSURES BY BUSINESS ASSOCIATE

- 3.1. Except as otherwise limited in this BAA, Business Associate may use or disclose PHI to perform functions, activities, or services for, or on behalf of, Covered Entity as specified in the Agreement, provided that such use or disclosure would not violate the Privacy Rule if done by Covered Entity.
- 3.2. Except as otherwise limited in this BAA, Business Associate may use PHI for the proper management and administration of the Business Associate or to carry out the legal responsibilities of the Business Associate.
- **3.3.** Except as otherwise limited in this BAA, Business Associate may disclose PHI for the proper management and administration of the Business Associate provided that disclosures are either:
  - is Required by Law; or
  - Business Associate obtains reasonable assurance from any
    person or entity to which Business Associate will disclose
    Covered Entity's PHI that the person or entity will: (1) hold
    Covered Entity's PHI in confidence and use or further disclose
    Covered Entity's PHI only for the purpose for which Business
    Associate disclosed Covered Entity's PHI to the person or
    entity or as Required by Law; and (2) promptly notify
    Business Associate of any instance of which the person or

entity becomes aware in which the confidentiality of Covered Entity's PHI was breached.

- **3.4.** Except as otherwise limited in this BAA, Business Associate may use PHI to provide Data Aggregation services to Covered Entity as permitted by 45 C.F.R. 164.504(e)(2)(i)(B).
- **3.5.** Business Associate may use PHI to report violations of law to appropriate Federal and State authorities, consistent with 45 C.F.R. 164.502(j)(1).
- 3.6. Business Associate will, in its performance of the functions, activities, services, and operations specified above, make reasonable efforts to use, to disclose, and to request on the minimum amount of Covered Entity's PHI reasonably necessary to accomplish the intended purposes of the use, disclosure or request, except that Business Associate will not be obligated to comply with this minimum-necessary limitation if neither Business Associate nor Covered Entity is required to limit its use, disclosure or request to the minimum necessary. Business Associate and Covered Entity acknowledge that the phrase "minimum necessary" shall be interpreted in accordance with the HITECH Act, passed as part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009, and government guidance on the definition.
- 3.7. As of the effective date specified by HHS in final regulations to be issued on this topic, Business Associate shall not directly or indirectly receive remuneration in exchange for any PHI unless the Covered Entity or Business Associate obtained from the individual, in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.508, a valid authorization that includes a specification of whether the PHI can be further exchanged for remuneration by the entity receiving by the entity receiving PHI of that individual, except as otherwise allowed under the HITECH Act.

### 4. OBLIGATIONS OF COVERED ENTITY

- 4.1. Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any limitation(s) in its notice of privacy practices of Covered Entity in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.520, to the extent that such limitation may affect Business Associate's use or disclosure of PHI.
- **4.2.** Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any changes in, or revocation of, permission by Individual to use or disclose PHI, to the extent that such limitation may affect Business Associate's use or disclosure of PHI.
- **4.3.** Covered Entity shall notify Business Associate of any restriction to the use or disclosure of PHI that Covered Entity has agreed to in accordance with 45 C.F.R. 164.522, to the extent that such limitation may affect Business Associate's use or disclosure of PHI.
- 4.4. Covered Entity shall not request Business Associate to use or disclose PHI in any manner that would not be permissible under the Privacy Rule if done by Covered Entity with the exception of any uses or disclosures as allowed by Section 3 above.

### 5. TERM AND TERMINATION

- 5.1. Term. The term of this BAA shall be effective as of the Effective Date of the Agreement, and shall terminate when all of the PHI provided by Covered Entity to Business Associate, or created or received by Business Associate on behalf of Covered Entity, is destroyed or returned to Covered Entity, or, if it is infeasible to return or destroy PHI, protections are extended to such information, in accordance with the termination provisions in this section.
- 5.2. Termination for Cause. Upon Covered Entity's knowledge of a material breach by Business Associate of this BAA, Covered Entity shall provide an opportunity for Business Associate to cure the breach or end the violation and terminate this BAA and the Agreement if Business Associate does not cure the breach or end the violation within a reasonable time period, or immediately terminate this BAA and the Agreement if Business Associate has breached a material term of this BAA and cure is not possible.

### 6. EFFECT OF TERMINATION

- **6.1.** Except as provided in section 6.2, upon termination of this BAA, for any reason, Business Associate shall return or destroy all PHI received from Covered Entity, or created or received by Business Associate on behalf of Covered Entity. This provision shall apply to PHI that is in the possession of subcontractors or agents of Business Associate. Business Associate shall retain no copies of the PHI
- 6.2. In the event that Business Associate determines that returning or destroying the PHI is infeasible, Business Associate shall provide to Covered Entity notification of the conditions that make return or destruction infeasible. Upon mutual agreement of the parties that return or destruction of PHI is infeasible, Business Associate shall extend the protections of this BAA to such PHI and limit further uses and disclosures of such PHI to those purposes that make the return or destruction infeasible, for so long as Business Associate maintains such PHI.

### 7. MISCELLANEOUS

- 7.1. Regulatory References. A reference in this BAA to a section in the Privacy or Security Rule means the section as in effect or as amended, and for which compliance is required.
- 7.2. Amendment. The Parties agree to take such action as is necessary to amend this BAA from time to time as is necessary for Covered Entity to comply with the requirements of the Privacy and Security Rules and the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act, Public Law 104-191, including the HITECH Act, and any guidance and regulations promulgated thereunder.
- **7.3. Survival**. The respective rights and obligations of Business Associate under section 6 of this BAA shall survive the termination of this BAA.
- 7.4. Interpretation. Any ambiguity in this BAA shall be resolved in favor of a meaning that permits Covered Entity to comply with the Privacy Rule.

### SCHEDULE D - ATL AGREEMENT FOR PROTECTED DATA

This Agreement for Protected Data ("Data Agreement") is made and entered into as of the date of the Agreement by and between ATL and Client and is incorporated into the Agreement by this reference and shall be subject to the terms and conditions of the Agreement and its Schedules.

WHEREAS, ATL has a hosted software solution; and

WHEREAS, Client uses certain software services of ATL under the Agreement; and

WHEREAS, Client, if applicable, and ATL are committed to compliance with all state and federal statutes and regulations, including but not limited to the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996 (as amended, "HIPAA") and regulations promulgated thereunder.

**NOW, THEREFORE**, in consideration for the mutual promises set forth herein and other good and valuable consideration, and intending to be legally bound, the parties hereto agree as follows:

### 1. DEFINITIONS

Terms used but not otherwise defined in this Data Agreement shall have the same meaning as those terms in the Privacy Rule.

- 1.1. Aggregated Data shall mean Data from multiple Clients in the ATL LIMS On-Demand Network;
- 1.2. Authorized Purpose shall mean any use by ATL or an ATL Contractor of Client Data as provided for in this Data Agreement and, if applicable, permissible under HIPAA, specifically those purposes for which a Limited Data Set may be used which are research, public health or health care operations, as provided in 45 CFR Sect. 164.514(e)(3);
- 1.3. Client Data shall mean Limited Data Sets of information from Client's ATL LIMS System shared with the ATL LIMS On-Demand Network. Client Data does not include Protected Health Information that has not been extracted into a Limited Data Set;
- 1.4. ATL Contractor shall mean a third party that will have access to Client Data through the ATL LIMS On-Demand Network and agrees to be bound by a Data Use Agreement which shall include at least the same restrictions, terms, and conditions that apply to the ATL LIMS On-Demand Network under this Data Agreement with respect to Client Data.
- **1.5.** Limited Data Set shall have the same meaning as the term "limited data set" in 45 CFR Sect. 164.514(e) of the Privacy Rule.
- 1.6. Privacy Rule shall mean the Standards for Privacy of Individually Identifiable Health Information at 45 CFR Part 160 and Part 164, Subparts A and E, as amended from time to time.
- **1.7. Protected Health Information** shall have the same meaning as that term in 45 CFR 160.103 of the HIPAA Privacy Rule.
- 1.8. Security Rule shall mean the Security Standards for the Protection of Electronic Protected Health Information at 45 C.F.R. Part 160 and Part 164, Subparts A and C, as amended from time to time.
- **1.9. Study Agreement** shall mean an agreement directly between Client and an ATL Contractor for participation in Studies.

### 2. OBLIGATIONS OF PARTIES

- 2.1. Client owns all right, title and interest to the client data. This Data Agreement addresses ATL's access to and use of Client Data, and as such serves as a Data Use Agreement between Client and ATL pursuant to 45 CFR 164.514(e).
- 2.2. Client Data. By participating in the ATL LIMS On-Demand Network, Client agrees that ATL may, through its VPN network, extract Limited Data Sets from Client Data to be used for any Authorized Purpose.
- 2.3. Use of Client Data. ATL agrees to use and disclose Client Data only for an Authorized Purpose or as required by law, and shall ensure

that its respective directors, officers, employees, contractors and agents do not use or disclose Client Data in any manner that would constitute a violation of the Privacy Rule if used or disclosed by the Client. In addition, Client agrees that ATL may disclose to an ATL Contractor, Protected Health Information if Client has entered a Study Agreement which authorizes such disclosure. Client also agrees that ATL may host in the ATL LIMS On- Demand Network archive copies of Client Data and Protected Health Information disclosed or transmitted to an ATL Contractor.

- 2.4. Safeguards against Misuse of Information. ATL will use appropriate physical, technological and administrative safeguards to prevent the use or disclosure of Client Data, other than as permitted under this Data Agreement, and to protect the security, integrity and availability of electronic Client Data to which it has proper access.
- 2.5. Reporting of Unauthorized Disclosures. ATL shall promptly upon becoming aware of any use or disclosure of Client Data in violation of this Data Agreement by any of its officers, directors, employees, contractors or agents or by a third party to which ATL discloses Client Data, report such disclosure, in writing, to the Client from which the Client Data had been obtained. If protected data has been disclosed client shall be responsible for notifying its Patients about any disclosure for which such notification is mandated by state or federal law.
- 2.6. Agreements by Third Parties. Each agent, ATL Contractor, or other person that has or will have access to Client Data through the ATL LIMS On-Demand Network shall agree to be bound by a Data Use Agreement which shall include at least the same restrictions, terms, and conditions that apply to the ATL LIMS On-Demand Network under this Data Agreement with respect to Client Data.
- 2.7. Notice of Request for Data. ATL agrees to notify Client promptly upon receipt of any request for production or subpoena of Client Data, in connection with any governmental investigation or governmental or civil proceeding.
- 2.8. Termination upon Breach. This Data Agreement may be terminated by either party upon five (5) days prior written notice to the other party in the event that such other party breaches any provision of this Data Agreement and such breach is not cured within such five (5) day period. Upon termination, Client will no longer allow ATL or an ATL Contractor to access, use or disclose Client Data and shall notify the Secretary of the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services of the situation pursuant to 45 CFR 164.514(e). Each party shall have the right to fully exercise any remedy existing at law or in equity in the event the other party breaches or violates this Data Agreement.
- 2.9. Return or Destruction of Data. Upon Termination of this Data Agreement, ATL shall either return Protected Health Information to Client, or destroy such Protected Health Information, as appropriate in its discretion.
- 2.10. Survival of Terms. The terms and provisions of this Data Agreement that protect Client Data shall survive expiration or termination of this Data Agreement and such information shall thereafter only be used or disclosed for the Authorized Purpose.
- 2.11. Entire Agreement. This Data Agreement supersedes all previous representations, understandings or agreements regarding the Client Data and shall prevail notwithstanding any variance with terms and conditions of any other document submitted by or on behalf of Client or ATL regarding the Client Data; provided, that, to the extent the Client enters into a Study Agreement with ATL or an ATL Contractor outlining the terms of the Client's participation

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# SCHEDULE D - ATL AGREEMENT FOR PROTECTED DATA

- in a specific Study, the terms of such Study Agreement shall govern the use of Client Data for such Study.
- 2.12. Amendment. The Parties agree to take such action as is necessary to amend this Data Agreement from time to time as is necessary for Covered Entity to comply with the requirements of the Privacy and Security Rules, HIPAA and other federal, state or local law as in existence from time to time.

### SCHEDULE E – SERVICE LEVELS

<u>General</u>. This **Schedule E** sets forth the Service Levels against which ATL's performance of the Software Services (as defined in the Agreement) will be measured and describes the methodology for calculating Service Level Credits (defined below) that may become due and payable to Client if ATL fails to achieve any Service Levels. The Service Levels are set forth in Section 6 below.

- Service Level Credits. ATL shall issue credits ("Service Level Credits") to
  Client for any failure by ATL to meet or exceed a Service Level in
  accordance with this Schedule E. Service Level Credits will be issued on
  a monthly basis based upon ATL's performance of the Software Services
  in the prior month and will be applied against ATL's next monthly invoice
  for the Software Services.
- Measurements and Reporting. Commencing on the first Access date, ATL shall provide Client a monthly report in sufficient detail to verify ATL's performance of the Software Services as measured by the Service Levels.
- 3. <u>Exclusions</u>. ATL shall not be responsible for its failure to meet any Service Levels to the extent its performance of the Software Services is adversely affected by the occurrence of any of the following events:
  - (i) Client's failure to perform its obligations under the Agreement;
  - (ii) the wrongful acts or omissions of Client or any of its third-party vendors;
  - (iii) the failure of any of Client's employees to adequately perform their tasks related to the Software Services;
  - (iv) unreasonable, untimely, incomplete or inaccurate information from Client;
  - (v) the failure of a Client's equipment or software in a manner that is not ATL's fault;
  - (vi) the occurrence of a Force Majeure Event, which shall mean a delay in the performance of ATL's obligations under the Agreement if and to the extent caused, directly or indirectly, by fire, flood, earthquake, elements of nature or acts of God; riots, civil disorders, wars, acts of terrorism, rebellions or revolutions in any country; acts or omissions of third parties; or any other cause beyond the reasonable control of that party;
  - (vii) Scheduled Downtime (as defined below); and/or,
  - (viii) other reasons outside of ATL's control, including any of the following:
    - Failure of any connectivity not provided by or on behalf of ATL, including external connectivity used by tele-workers to the extent such external connectivity is not provided by ATL.
    - Failure of electric utility power at the Client's facilities, provided that such failure is not arising from or related to any act or omission of ATL or its agents.
    - Domain Name Service (DNS) failure, when such services are not under ATL's control or controlled or provided by an agent of ATL.
    - Scheduled maintenance or system updates to the Software Services performed by ATL personnel or its representatives.
    - An equipment or software failure of any ATL server so long as the failure does not affect the ability for the Client to print from or access the Software Services.
    - Any problems accessing any email, web address, or application other than those directly provided by ATL, or controlled or provided by an agent of ATL for the Software Services
    - Any third-party application that is installed or updated by Client and/or a third party that causes the Software Services

- to lose any degree of functionality. As an example, many third-party programs may rely on function libraries or other components which may be overwritten by Windows OS or Office updates, or another third-party application that causes the Software Services to no longer function. Some websites may not be accessible due to system security settings or version conflicts (JVM, ActiveX, plug-ins, etc.). Some third-party applications may rely on access to external servers or services which are not hosted by ATL (email, interface servers, web portals, etc.).
- 4. Scheduled Downtime. ATL's standard maintenance window is each Sunday night from 6:00 p.m. ET to 5:00 a.m. ET ("Standard Window") at which time the Software Services may be unavailable for use due to scheduled maintenance. In addition, ATL may perform scheduled maintenance from 1:00 a.m. ET to 5:00 a.m. ET each morning and ATL will notify Client for any maintenance expected to prevent access to the Software Services for more than 15 minutes. The notification shall include the reason and the procedure for implementing the change. Except in cases of emergency, notification will be provided at least two (2) weeks prior to such planned downtime. In cases of emergency, ATL will notify Client of a planned downtime within one (1) hour of such emergency. Client will approve of any scheduled maintenance downtime, which will cause the total scheduled maintenance downtime for the month to exceed two (2) hours.



# SANTIAGO RESERVOIR IMPROVEMENTS PROJECT UPDATE, CONSULTANT VARIANCE, AND BUDGET INCREASE

# **SUMMARY:**

The AECOM/GEI design team has made significant progress on the Santiago Creek Dam Outlet Tower and Spillway Improvements ("Santiago Reservoir Improvements") project and is advancing the 100% design. As the design phase progressed, the design team and staff identified additional tasks that are required to successfully complete the design. In parallel to advancing the design of the project, IRWD continued to further its understanding of the potential for seismically induced cracking of the existing embankment and the associated risk if such an event were to occur. Now that IRWD further analyzed the possibility of such an event, staff recommends that IRWD proceed with conducting a cracking mitigation alternatives analysis.

### Staff recommends that the Board:

- Authorize the General Manager to execute a variance in the amount of \$721,677 with AECOM for additional engineering design services, and
- Authorize a budget increase in the amount of \$200,693,000, from \$139,307,000 to \$340,000,000 for the Santiago Reservoir Improvements project.

# BACKGROUND:

In 2017, IRWD contracted with AECOM for the design of the Outlet Tower Replacement project to improve the seismic performance of the structure by removing the existing tower and installing a new inclined outlet structure embedded in bedrock adjacent to the spillway. Also in 2017, IRWD contracted with GEI to perform a condition assessment of the Santiago Creek Dam spillway structure. GEI completed the multi-phase condition assessment in 2019 and IRWD and Serrano Water District (SWD) decided to replace the nearly 90-year-old structure that is reaching the end of its useful life.

In April 2020, IRWD combined the two projects and retained AECOM (with GEI as its subconsultant) to design the combined Santiago Reservoir Improvements project. Since starting the design for the combined project, the design team and staff accomplished the following key milestones:

- Confirmed the hydraulic design criteria for the new spillway structure with the Division of Safety of Dams (DSOD);
- Completed all phases of planned geotechnical investigations that are focused on characterizing the soil properties for the outlet and spillway improvements;
- Built and tested a physical model of the spillway to evaluate the performance of the new structure in a controlled laboratory environment;

- Completed the 90% design and started advancing the 100% design;
- Developed the initial draft of the easement and reimbursement agreement with the County of Orange, Orange County Waste & Recycling (OCWR), and Orange County Parks; and
- Completed the initial draft of the Environmental Impact Report (EIR).

The existing spillway structure has a crest elevation of 790 feet. Since its original construction in 1933, Irvine Lake has accumulated sediment that rain events have transported from the 63.2 square mile watershed. To regain original Irvine Lake capacity, the new spillway structure will be constructed with a weir crest elevation of 796 feet, which is two feet above the flashboards that DSOD permits IRWD and SWD to install in the summer months. This higher spillway crest elevation also allows year-round water storage for the volume of water that is currently stored behind the flashboards on a seasonal basis. The design team studied the dam performance with a raised spillway crest and concluded the embankment could accommodate the nominal two-foot increase in maximum water level from the top of the flashboards, which can only be installed between April 1 to October 1. In 2021, DSOD completed its review of the performance analysis with the nominal increase in water level and concluded that the performance results were acceptable.

The project also includes access improvements to the dam and related facilities, which include providing access from the adjacent landfill property and widening the dam crest. Staff and OCWR have been collaborating on an agreement that would allow IRWD access through the closed Santiago Canyon Landfill to provide access the dam without crossing Santiago Creek downstream of the dam. The project also includes removing the upper portion of the earth embankment along the nearly quarter-mile long dam crest and the construction of a retaining wall that allows the widening of the narrow dam crest.

Now that the design of the spillway and outlet tower has substantially progressed and the geotechnical investigations for the improvements are complete, the construction improvements are largely known. To successfully construct the improvements, the project includes the following major elements and construction techniques:

- Utilizing "The Flats" as a primary staging area for the contractor;
- Draining Irvine Lake with a comprehensive stream diversion and lake dewatering plan to create a dry environment for constructing the improvements;
- Constructing a temporary diversion berm upstream of Santiago Creek Dam;
- Mobilizing a conventional concrete batch plant and a roller compacted concrete batch plant:
- Constructing the spillway improvements over multiple dry seasons with extended 20-hour workdays;
- Installing anchors and tiebacks along the spillway floor and walls, respectively; and
- Constructing a rock anchor sloped wall along the spillway structure and OCWR property.

Santiago Creek Dam will remain a functioning dam throughout all phases of construction and every winter season the dam will have a functional spillway. The systematic approach to constructing the improvements, the complexity of the improvements, and the construction inflation rate over the past few years are significant contributors to the updated project cost.

# Existing Operations of Irvine Lake:

In 2020, after identifying the need to replace the spillway, the Districts (IRWD and SWD) evaluated and implemented an Interim Operations Plan. The Interim Operations Plan introduced a wintertime water level restriction that minimizes the potential use of the existing spillway structure. While the existing spillway remains safe to operate, the Districts determined that a level restriction would serve as an interim risk reduction measure until the reservoir improvements are constructed. DSOD later reviewed the Interim Operation Plan and ultimately imposed the seasonal level restriction until the new spillway structure and outlet tower improvements are complete. The Districts have successfully operated under this plan, which has required occasional releases of water from Irvine Lake to maintain a water level at or below 762.5 feet between October 31 and March 14 and 772.5 feet between March 15 and April 1.

# Cracking Study, Risk Analysis, and Impacts on the Project:

Traditionally, dam safety assessments – which are integral components of any Dam Safety Program – utilize a standards-based approach that follows established rules and guidelines for design events and loads, structural capacities, and defensive design measures. Historically, the standards-based approach to dam safety has proven to be good practice, but that approach omits consideration of other dam safety elements such as human factors, operational issues, and other unique circumstances that could potentially expose dam owners to increased levels of risk.

Another approach to dam safety that has been used at the federal level is Risk-Informed Decision Making (RIDM), which is a more rigorous, systematic, and thorough process to dam safety that focuses on identifying and reducing risks. In the late 1990s, the Bureau of Reclamation was the first agency to incorporate RIDM into its dam safety program. Since that time, RIDM is now used by several dam regulators and dam owners throughout the United States. In 2020, DSOD announced to California dam owners that it will be integrating RIDM into its regulatory oversight of dams under its jurisdiction.

In parallel to advancing the preliminary design activities for the Santiago Reservoir Improvements project, IRWD started integrating RIDM as a core component of its Dam Safety Program to enhance its program and align with DSOD's future state-wide RIDM-based dam safety program. As part of RIDM, IRWD completed Semi-Quantitative Risk Analysis (SQRA) on all five of its earth embankment dams, including Santiago Creek Dam. The risk analysis identified that the overall risk of the dam is largely driven by the potential for seismically induced cracking of the embankment. While the risk of potential cracking is small and the dam continues to meet all the DSOD requirements, the IRWD and SWD Boards approved advancing studies to further understand the possibility and also approved a geotechnical investigation focused on characterizing the strength parameters of the embankment and its foundation. Staff

and AECOM coordinated the geotechnical exploration efforts with DSOD and in February 2023 DSOD authorized IRWD to proceed with drilling several borings in Santiago Creek Dam.

AECOM, the lead design firm for the Santiago Reservoir Improvements project, completed the cracking study analysis, which incorporated data gathered from the geotechnical investigation. The study analyzed the performance of the dam for a wide range of seismic events, described the range of possibilities, and established the basis for conducting risk analysis. IRWD contracted with HDR to facilitate a multi-day Quantitative Risk Analysis (QRA) Workshop with a total of five independent Subject Matter Experts (SME's). The team of SME's included staff from Gannett Fleming, GEI, Geosyntec, and HDR. Collectively, the team of SME's have nearly 200 years of combined experience and expertise in cracking analysis, seismology, geotechnical engineering, and DSOD requirements. Staff and the risk team completed the QRA workshop, and staff will present the findings during the Board meeting.

# Design Variance No. 7:

AECOM submitted a variance in the amount of \$721,677 that includes items required to complete the design, a geotechnical exploration of potential on-site borrow locations, and a cracking mitigation alternatives analysis. The additional design scope items, which account for approximately half of the overall variance request, largely includes addressing specific requests from DSOD. A geotechnical investigation that is focused on identifying on-site borrow material is included in the variance request to explore opportunities to improve the overall construction cost. The variance request also includes a task for AECOM to complete cracking mitigation alternatives analysis. The scope of work and variance are attached as Exhibit "A".

Staff will provide a presentation during the Board meeting that elaborates on the items presented herein. The draft presentation is attached as Exhibit "B".

# FISCAL IMPACTS:

The project will be funded 75% by IRWD and 25% by SWD in accordance with the Irvine Lake ownership agreements. IRWD will fund its portion using predominately the Water Replacement Fund and the Regional Capital Improvement Fund for the cost associated with increasing the reservoir storage by raising the spillway crest.

# **ENVIRONMENTAL COMPLIANCE:**

The project is subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA). An Environmental Impact Report is being prepared in conformance with CEQA, California Code of Regulations Title 14, Chapter 3, Article 7, Section 15081.

Dear Jacob.

Following submission of the 90% Design Deliverable, occurrence of the 90% Design Workshop, and submission of the Dam Cracking Analysis Technical Memo, AECOM and GEI have worked together to develop a preliminary variance request for the additional tasks necessary to complete the final design phase of the Santiago Creek Dam Outlet Tower and Spillway Improvements Project. Below is a breakdown of the additional tasks and explanation of why they are required to complete the final design phase.

- Final Design Report: Upon submission of the 90% Design Deliverable, California Division of Safety of Dams (DSOD) determined that a signed and seal Final Design Report (FDR) is required for this project to provide a complete written design narrative for the project scope. The latest version of the Preliminary Design Report is dated July 2022; this version will be updated to reflect the changes in the design approach to satisfy this DSOD requirement. We assume there will be minor comments to address following the District's review of the draft report.
- Spillway Wall Walkway/Stairway: IRWD determined that a walkway/stairway is desired along the right
  wall of the spillway chute, from the Dam Control Building to the Stilling Basin structure. A conceptual
  design was included in the 90% design by GEI as a placeholder. GEI will develop this design
  thoroughly to include a stairway with platforms that extend along the right wall of the spillway chute,
  satisfying Cal-OSHA compliance requirements while allowing dam operation and maintenance teams
  to keep a visual line-of-sight to the bottom of the spillway.
- Three-Dimensional Modeling of group effect of anchors on Right Tieback Wall: HDR's Draft Design Risk Analysis Report requested GEI "Evaluate group effect capacity of all passive and active anchors for rock cone type failures, for those that have not yet considered this effect where applicable (e.g. Type 1 wall tiebacks)." GEI proposes to evaluate the group effect with a three-dimensional model for the Type 1 right wall. This wall has an unusual geometry with a re-entrant corner where the tiebacks converge in a tight area. GEI previously addressed DSOD's comment related to tiebacks in this area by creating a three-dimensional layout in CADD of the tiebacks to determine potential points of intersection, given typical construction tolerances. The tieback locations are currently undergoing further refinement. The model necessary to address HDR's comment will expand upon previous modeling work done to focus on modeling the mechanical group capacity of the wall. This will help to demonstrate that the converging anchors do not reduce the overall capacity of the wall to hold back the abutment and reservoir water. The analysis and results will be documented in a brief Technical Memorandum.
- Incorporate Automatic Data Acquisition (ADAS) Requirements for Instrumentation: GEI will
  incorporate ADAS requirements for the instrumentation in the 100% design to provide integration and
  consistency with IRWD's overall instrumentation plan for its dam portfolio. This task will include



- addressing the Orange County Waste and Recycling (OCWR) request to install in-place inclinometers (IPIs) around the flare station and furnish an ADAS for the IPIs for construction monitoring.
- Environmental Mitigation Measures Irrigation: In coordination with the District's environmental
  consultant Psomas, AECOM will develop a design for irrigation systems at areas where impervious
  material is removed from the dam site. These irrigation systems will be fed from IRWD's Irvine Lake
  Pipeline and an irrigation boosting system design will be provided as needed. Coordination with
  Psomas and meeting time will be included in this scope.
- Embankment Cracking Mitigation Alternatives: AECOM will develop up to 3 conceptual mitigation
  alternatives for the potential seismic induced embankment cracking. The alternative study will be
  summarized in a draft Technical Memorandum (TM) including plans, sections, material quantity take
  offs, class 5 cost estimates and a discussion of each alternative. The TM will be revised addressing
  IRWD review/comments.
- Geotechnical Exploration for Potential Borrow Area Locations: AECOM will perform field exploration program for the potential borrow areas located within or immediately adjacent to Irvine Lake (within IRWD's property-line). AECOM has identified four (4) borrow areas (see attached location map) that could potentially provide the required soil material. Geotechnical Investigations of these borrow areas will be done to verify that adequate quantities of suitable soil are available for construction of the diversion berm and possible cracking mitigation. AECOM will prepare a Geotechnical Investigation Work Plan and submit to IRWD prior to performing the exploration and testing. Excavator test pits, and hollow stem auger borings will be done to obtain soil samples within accessible on shore portions of the borrow areas. Standpipe piezometers (groundwater monitoring wells) will be installed in two hollow stem auger borings to allow for slug testing (permeability testing) and measurements of groundwater levels. For those portions of the borrow area that are below the lake, vibracore samples will be taken from a drill barge. Geotechnical laboratory testing will be performed on selected soil samples and following completion of the testing, the findings of the investigation will be documented in a Technical Memorandum.
- Construction Dewatering Baseline Design: GEI will develop a three-dimensional (3D) numerical groundwater model to evaluate and conceptually design a dewatering system. In this groundwater model, dewatering well points and sump locations and depths will be simulated and optimized to provide a system that is predicted to lower the water table to target depths. We consider a 3D model necessary due to asymmetric flow conditions and geometries, such as the low-permeability dam embankment abutting higher-permeability rock in the area of the overflow weir. GEI proposes to use MODFLOW, an industry standard software for computation of flow in the saturated zone.

The design task will include:

- 1) Using the model to calculate a pre-construction water table, that may be expected once the reservoir is drained.
- 2) Inputting target water level depths into the model.
  - a. Overflow weir and intake area: the rock excavation may be up to 50 feet deep, and 40 feet below the current water table. Excavation depths in the overflow area are variable due to the mapping of unsuitable rock types to be excavated. Due to variability and uncertainty in bedrock permeability and fracture interconnectedness, we will likely include redundancy in the design as to the number of dewatering wells.
  - b. Stilling basin: excavation depth at the stilling basin is approximately 15 feet below the estimated present water table. Based on preliminary review, we anticipate the use of sumps in the stilling basin area, due to relatively high rock strength and lower permeability.
- 3) Input of dewatering wells and sumps into the model, with optimization of well spacings, locations, depths, and pumping rates. For the overflow weir area, we anticipate the need for wells and pumps due to weak, permeable rock and relatively high drawdown. For the stilling basin area,



where rock is relatively hard and of relatively lower permeability, we anticipate use of sumps and pumps for the dewatering.

In step 3, the objective is to develop a realistic but conservative estimate of dewatering system components. A sensitivity analysis will be performed to evaluate the effect of rock permeability on the dewatering system design, for purposes of establishing confidence in the results and informing quantities to be used in the cost estimate.

The deliverable will include a memo summarizing the model, including groundwater contours showing the inferred present-conditions water table; the pre-construction water table after draining the reservoir, and computed water levels stabilized during drawdown. The system design portion include:

- Plan showing dewatering wells.
- Schedule of dewatering wells (location, depth/diameter, flow rate, lift)
- Dewatering well detail sections.
- Source data (boring logs, test results, water level measurements, literature citations, etc.).
- Groundwater model documentation.
- Disclaimers: standard limitations of groundwater model simplifications; notation that the design is conceptual and for bid purposes only.







Santiago Creek Dam Spillway Physical Model





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


