IRWD is ready for fire and other emergencies

Irvine Ranch Water District is prepared for emergencies, including wildfires and the Public Safety Power Shutoffs that electric utilities can implement to guard against them.

With safety and service in mind, we plan for emergencies in everything we do. Here are some steps we take to be prepared:

- Backup power Our system is equipped with permanent and mobile generators.
- **Monitoring** We watch the weather to anticipate problems.
- Plan of action We top off water storage tanks, mobilize equipment and supplies to where they may be needed, and work with other agencies to plan a coordinated response.
- Providing water to aid in firefighting Our recycled water reservoirs serve as reliable sources of water to help protect our community from fire.

WHAT IRWD DOES TO PREPARE AND RESPOND:

Water storage tanks and reservoirs.

Permanent generators at pumping stations keep water flowing by pumping it uphill — where, using gravity, it can flow downhill to you.

Also, portable generators can be moved quickly to where they are needed to make sure firefighters have the water flow and pressure necessary to do their job.

California native corner Juan's August plant: woolly sunflower

Woolly sunflower (*Eriophyllum lanatum*) is an attractive perennial that grows in compact clumps that bloom profusely with yellow flowers in spring and summer. It does well in full sun to partial shade and can be extremely resilient under the right conditions. It is a pollinator magnet and a host plant for butterflies and moths.





Q: I can't understand my water bill. Can you explain how it works?

A: IRWD's budget based rate structure assigns each customer a water budget, based on the number of people in the home, the square footage of outdoor landscaping, and the weather—adjusting for the seasonal water needs of plants.

Customers who stay within their water budget enjoy some of the lowest water bills in Orange County. Those who exceed their budget pay a higher rate for the water above their budget to cover the costs of more expensive water sources and water efficiency programs needed to serve them.
