**Q:** We recently converted one of our sprinkler system stations to inline drip, and we're getting conflicting information on how to adjust the watering schedule to give the plants just the right amount of water they need. Can you help?

A: Because inline drip systems release water more slowly than spray heads, you'll need to increase your irrigation time—but the question of how much depends on the spacing between your rows, the types of plants in your landscape, and the time of year. You can find the information you need at **IRWD.com/wateringguide**. Click on the "drip schedule" button underneath the spray head chart for a helpful, printable schedule you can follow all year.

#### **California native corner** Juan's July plant: California aster

California aster (*Symphyotrichum chilense*) bursts with summer and fall flowers ranging in color from blue to lavender to yellow. It is fast-growing, reaching a size of 3-by-3 feet. Deadhead spent blooms to produce more flowers, and prune it low in late fall.





## **Q:** My water seems hard. Is it OK to drink?

A: Yes! Water hardness does not affect the safety of your drinking water. In fact, the calcium and magnesium that make water hard are essential minerals for our health.

Different blends of minerals change the taste of drinking water. IRWD's water hardness changes according to the water sources used to serve our communities at various times of year.

Areas served by mostly groundwater have lower hardness levels compared to those receiving more imported water from the mineralrich Colorado River and Northern California.

Concerned about spots? Try a rinse agent in your dishwasher, and soak fixtures in a vinegar solution to remove deposits. For more information, check out the FAQ at **IRWD.com/guality**.
